

Great Staughton Neighbourhood Plan

There has been progress on the Neighbourhood Plan (NP) for Great Staughton, but we have not been able to reach the next formal stage. This is the Regulation 15 consultation.

There have been delays associated with both potential development sites in the NP.

A Strategic Environmental Assessment is necessary on the Brook Farm site. The process has begun but is not yet completed. This is to ensure that the neighbouring conservation area is not adversely affected.

The Environment Agency have required a flood risk assessment on the other site on the Green. There is concern that it may be liable to flooding and therefore affect the ability to provide additional housing on this site. The assessment has now been completed but its results must now be considered by the Parish Council before submitting any updates or changes to the NP prior to its consideration by the District Council.

Discussions are proceeding on the feasibility of siting a new Doctor's surgery on the Brook Farm site, progress is being made but there a number of issues to resolve.

GREAT STAUGHTON HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY



I'm reading a book set in Iceland in the late 19th century. It's called Burial Rites by Hannah Kent and I'd really recommend it. The descriptions of peasant life through the seasons are graphic. We moan about the cold and dark of winter but we have it easy compared to people in a lot of the world. And thinking about conditions in times gone by even in Britain - should make us ashamed of a single complaint.

But whatever we have endured, the joy of the first snowdrop, crocus or daffodil can't be denied. The prospect of blossom and new leaves is also intoxicating. What will we grow this year?

We also have to consider what we grow it in and I'm sure that most of us choose peat free compost. We've all been educated about the value of peat bogs as carbon repositories, flood control mechanisms and valuable ecosystems. Buying peat free is an easy contribution we can make to the greater good. However I was reading an article this morning about the considerable use of peat by some commercial growers. We simply have no information about what our mushrooms, salad leaves and pot plants are grown in.

We get all sorts of data on animal welfare, organic eggs, milk and other produce but the market place is silent on peat use. Time for a campaign maybe? Our power as consumers is one of the few things that capitalism will respond to.

Another moral conundrum is terracotta or plastic pots. I've bought a lot of terracotta pots in my time - at considerable cost. I do like the look of them but they crumble and disintegrate with monotonous regularity. Do I simply replace like for like or "shock horror" buy plastic or glass fibre replacements? I suppose the best compromise is to try to find a material that can be reliably recycled. The ideal would be a plastic that can simply be used over and over again but I don't know if pots are available in that sort of material as yet.

It's exhausting trying to do the right thing! And for every direction taken there is probably an opposite one which is equally valid. One can only do one's best.

As to the Horticultural Society, it is coming to life for the new season and you are very welcome to become involved. The AGM is scheduled for Wednesday 6th March at 7.00pm in the White Hart. We'll be discussing the year's events, the first of which is the Plant Sale on Saturday 25th May at the Pavillion at 14.30. Even if you don't need any plants you can come and enjoy a cream tea.

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Bats in The House

In summer 2020, we had been undertaking a renovation project involving replacing a flat roof, installing new windows, etc. Work was coming to an end and I was trying to clean up a weatherboard. Scrapping it did not work. A wire brush on an electric drill did not work. So, I decided to replace the board. I unscrewed the old board and a black thing flew out. The vapour barrier underneath the board was covered in bat droppings.

On 26th August I contacted the Bat Trust with the question 'I can hear a squeaking noise coming from behind the boards from time to time. Your guidance on monitoring this to ascertain if it is an active roost would be appreciated. And, if it proves to be active, your advice on maintaining it as a roost would also be appreciated.' That turned out to have been a very bad decision. They sent somebody round who pronounced that 'The bats were pipistrelles and very little was known about them.' He then went on to say that 'all work would have to cease as it would disturb the bats'. He refused to listen to me and I politely waited for him to leave, the man did not know what he was talking about. The work was finished over the next few days.

In 2021, the bats were back in their roost. I knew this by their droppings on the window sill and I could hear the chattering. So much for disturbing them! In August 2022, I got in touch with Cambridgeshire Bat Group somewhat nervously after the experience with the Bat Trust. This proved to be a much more helpful and positive group to deal with. I explained about the bat roost, they offered to 'arrange for a group member to come out to visit in April/May to inspect the roost'. I signed up as a member.

There were regular emails with links to events, training courses and reports in the bat world. There was one about a church cleaning workshop that I forwarded to Nicki to forward on to her church wardens. One that caught my attention was a Bat Walk from Grafham Village Church that was part of a BioBlitz. Then, Rachel came and visited us one Sunday Evening. We sat in the garden and she produced a bat detector and waited. Two bats appeared from the weatherboarding which she said were Soprano Pipistrelles. The two more appeared from next door. Just before she left, a fifth bat was recorded which she said was a Noctule.

After Rachel's visit, she recommended a bat detector that I duly purchased. I would walk out into the garden at dusk to see what was there. One night it was Soprano Pipistrelles by the house, then Common Pipistrelles as I walked down the garden then a Barbastelle and finally a Noctule at the end of the garden.

In late August, Rachel organised a transect survey at Monks Wood nature reserve. We volunteered and visited the reserve during daylight to familiarise ourselves with the route. On the evening, there were 4 groups. We recorded Barbastelle, Daubenton's, Whiskered, Common Pipistrelle, Soprano Pipistrelle. I recognised three of the five bats. We came away thinking it would be good to organise a transact survey in Great Staughton to see what bats live around us.

It's best done with a northern accent because of the content of the text eg 'grand little lad', 'Mother was vexed' etc. Incidentally, Alex told us that the lion was named after the poet's brother Wallace, who went to Hollywood, reversed his name and made his fortune. I can hear you working it out and those of you of a certain age saying 'Oo well I never knew that, I used to like his programmes.'

Alex told us a little about people going to the Music Hall before the advent of radio. So if an act did a weekly gig around approximately 500 Music Halls, it would take them 10 years or so before they had to change the act!

We heard of a few famous acts and monologues; the story of Mad Carew and the green eye of the little yellow god (I once heard the great Ken Dodd do that one); of Billy Bennett who would take a monologue and change it slightly, so *It was Christmas Day in the Workhouse* became *It was Christmas Day in the Harem;* of Joyce Grenfell 'Stately as a Galleon'; Flanders and Swann; the sublime Pam Ayres and even *Ernie the Fastest*

Milkman in the West

Thanks Alex, we had a fun evening listening to your excellent delivery of some of the classics.

December rolled around with our Christmas celebration which in Perry WI terms meant nibbles and wine and a right good laugh. Our brilliant committee had organised a *Prosecco* or Cava or Nonsecco competition (I have to admit I didn't care, they all tasted wonderful!), a Guess the Name of the Christmas Crisps competition (camembert crisps anyone? Pigs in Blankets? Deeelish) and a *Guess the* Baby competition. I only got myself correct so ended up guessing wrongly and had a lot of fun with 'guessing' Marie Curie (it was Chris), Kylie Minogue (it was Ellie) and Michelle Obama (it was Issy) – legends! We were each given a gorgeous little house containing our present involving chocolate and knitting from Ann (how long did 22 cute Christmas puddings take to knit, Ann? They are gorgeous and mine is already on our Christmas tree – minus the chocolaty contents obviously!). We finished off with our traditional Pass the Parcel and wasn't it strange that everyone managed to open a layer! There was a Christmas quiz question, a Quality Street and a humbug between each and it was amusing to see how many people passed their humbug to a friend! Our worthy winner was Ann who won a basket with Christmas mugs, drinking chocolate sachets and marshmallow snowmen on sticks. Is there anything better than festive chocolate!

So happy Christmas ladies – even though it was yonks ago now!

January was a cracker! John Gibson finished his talk with 'We hope you'll never need us, but if you do we'll be there' and I don't doubt that there was a catch in every throat. John is an 11-year member of Service by Emergency Response Volunteers aka The Bloodrunners. You may have seen bikers with hi-viz jackets on with BLOOD on the back? Yep, that's John and his colleagues. Volunteers every one. Heroes every one.

SERV are a 24-hours a day, 365 days a year transport service which started out transporting blood, plasma and medicines between various hospitals. In 2012 human milk donations were added to the list and John reckoned it was a small step for them but I don't doubt that it has saved many tiny lives (in fact he told us that he had been part of the crew who had transported milk from a mother in hospital in Leicester to her baby in the Neonatal ICU in Peterborough for a while until baby was well enough to be back with Mum – now that's something unforgettable, eh). During COVID, oncology patients who were shielding had their prescriptions delivered by SERV, and also PPE to the many small clinics which needed them. In fact, demand for their services increased by 60% during COVID. And it all started because the NHS needed blood somewhere else and don't have a courier service from 7pm - 7am.

In our region (formed in 2010), they serve five hospitals, various hospices and the Air Ambulance (who get their blood fresh, keep it for one day and, if unused, return it to the hospital for use there). To date, the Suffolk and Cambs region has completed 16,524 tasks and last year alone travelled 157,486 miles. Wow. They currently have 120 members, 12 controllers, work a minimum of two nights a month (though usually more) and have training on product handling and navigation. Not only this but they pay for their own fuel and even though they can claim it back if it goes above £250 a month ... no one ever has. SERV has no government or NHS funding and relies totally on donations and members' goodwill.

As a controller, one of John's jobs is to organise journeys and handovers which are in eg Tesco car park in Royston or Bury St Edmunds, the Black Cat, in fact anywhere where they can swiftly and safely continue the items' journey to where it is most needed. He has recently had to liaise with five other regions to get a rare blood transferred to its destination to save a life.

Like I said, no funding apart from donations so why not go on their website www.servsc.org.uk and check out how to help. Money is always welcome (it costs £45,000 a year to run this region), but you can also donate eg teddies for the Teddy Tombola, and satnavs and hand held devices (don't forget to unlock them and wipe them clean of your data as

they are worth more). Check it out!

These wonderful people have won the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service and in the 2018 Autumn Budget were officially recognised as one of the UK's Emergency Services.

So I'll finish with a few quotes from Bloodrunners which John shared; 'I've done something today...'

- 'Jump on a bike and save a life...'
- 'We're locals so we know the roads...'
- 'We don't know who, but we know we make a difference...'
- 'We're a motley crew...'
- 'Sometimes when hospitals ring, you can just tell by their tone of voice...'
 John Gibson and the Bloodrunners, ladies and gentlemen.

Apologies: None

- 1. Accounts: The Treasurer produced the draft accounts for the year (2023), which showed an increase in assets of £603.45. We had produced four colour covers this year and one colour centre, in the quarterly magazine. The Collection boxes fund third an edition. The adverts have stayed stable throughout the year. Both the Parish Councils returned to their pre-quarterly donation amounts. The Committee expressed their gratitude to them. The Winter Edition in December, Spring in March, Summer in June and Autumn in September with the content being larger and more relevant and exciting continues to be a success.
- 2. Bank Account: The money held in the Life Magazine account was £3680.27 which was £603.45 up on last year. We use an HSBC Community account with Bob Jewell, Helen Glanville and Nicole Yates as signatories. Copies of all bank statements are available at any time to ensure visibility.
- **3. Printing Costs:** Have increased to keep up with rising paper costs, but are still very competitive, still using Easiprint (now called Peterborough Print) for 2023 and into 2024.
- **4. Advertising Prices:** The committee are grateful to those loyal advertisers for sticking with the Magazine. Rates are £96.00 for a whole page for a quarter, pro-rated. £120.00 for small cover and £75.00 for a small. These will remain the same for 2024.
- **5. Posting Magazines Out of Area:** The cost of posting copies to 'out of area' readers will remain at £7.50.
- **6. Magazine makeup:** We have managed to run a one 44-page magazine and three 48-

page magazines. All have had a colour cover and one had a colour centre.

- 7. Advertisers: The policy, that advertisers who are slow to pay are invoiced twice and/ or given one quarters grace with their advert, but then are removed from the Magazine, was reaffirmed. All community content and free ads will only remain for one edition and then be removed. If you want it to stay in then you need to let the editors know in order for it to remain. Also, if your advert changes then please remember to send the editors the new version as soon as possible to ensure you are giving correct information to the readers.
- **8. Editor's Payment:** It was agreed to pay the Editors payment to Rob. The editors incur many costs and it was felt that even this token amount will help towards paying for some of it! The committee agreed to a rate of £175.00. It will be paid by BACS. Shaun left us to further his business this year but Rob has kindly agreed to continue editing. The rest of the committee truly thanked him and Shaun for their hard work. Our plea for new editors had a volunteer from GS but again no -one from Perry. Eugene will put in PC minutes and try to raise awareness. In the meantime he has kindly volunteered to undertake some Editor training. The Committee is very grateful to both volunteers!
- **9. Minutes to be Published:** It was agreed to continue to publish these minutes on the Village website and within the magazine. The website minutes still have been well read and commented on.
- 10. AOB: We still have spaces on the cover for advertising. £75 for small and £120 for large for the year. We need more adverts so please tell your friends and family about Life and always mention Life if you reply to an advert. Photocopies and scans do not reproduce well enough to meet the printing requirements. Still, if anyone has any historical photos we would love to include those too. Any interesting pictures of the village would be really appreciated.

The committee would appreciate more input

from Perry to get more content for the magazine.

Finally, the committee is delighted to have been able to continue to produce the magazine throughout 2023 and thank everyone for their contributions.

PERRY HOG WATCH



My Hedgehog interest began about five years ago when I found one in my garden during the day time. I didn't really know what to do with it but put it under a bush out of the glare of the sun. After contacting Suzanne Tibbetts, an amazing lady who runs Hartford Hedgehog Rescue Centre, I quickly scooped it up and took it to her where she treated it for dehydration. round worm and lungworm, all fatal to a hedgehog if left untreated. After chatting to her about her work, I became a volunteer helper and signed up for a course run by The Vale Wildlife Centre to find out how to treat sick and injured hedgehogs. Last year I was able to advise various residents of Perry about hedgehogs they had found and took at least six of them to Suzanne and Cromwell Vets in Huntingdon. This coming year I hope I will be able to answer some frequently asked questions, encourage everyone to help create a Perry Super Highway for hedgehogs and give an update on all things hedgehog in Perry.

Know your hedgehog - Some basic facts and tips

Hedgehogs don't have hibernation calendars! There is no guaranteed date that hedgehogs will hibernate. It varies year on year depending on weather conditions and temperature. Usually in late November/Early December they start to find and build a nest. However, some have been up and about on milder days all winter which is why we must try to put food and water out all year.

Were you given a Hedgehog House for Christmas?

It's not too late to put it out or to buy or make one! If the temperature goes up hedgehogs will wake up to refuel and then go back to sleep not necessarily into the same box which is why yours is so important, as it might be just what they are looking for. Site your Hog House in a nice sheltered corner away from a North /North Easterly wind, rain and snow. Place under bushes not out in the open, they like to feel

hidden away. The house needs to have a waterproof roof and slightly raised up off the ground. Put hay inside and a few leaves though they do like to choose their own materials. Leave plant pots turned on their side full of hay (dust free type) and a variety of leaves. Straw tends to be a bit harsh and can give hoglets paper type cuts to their delicate skin. **Don't** put food and water in the nest house. Keep it just for sleeping. A simple feeding station can be made from a plastic container and placed nearby.

Spring

A hedgehog usually needs help if out in the daylight however a hedgehog during the day moving purposefully along a fence or a wall in your garden may be a female looking for nesting materials. If the garden is shady and the weather overcast, to a hedgehog this looks like dusk due to their very poor eyesight and so they may be seen out earlier than expected in the evening.

If you see any of the following though it is in need of urgent help

- A hedgehog collapsed in the open
- Sunbathing Hedgehogs **do not** sunbathe
- Spinning in tight circles
- Flies buzzing around it
- Wounds or dragging its legs
- Wobbling
- Asleep in the open Hedgehogs will always find somewhere secluded to curl up and sleep.
- If you accidentally disturb a nest cover it back up immediately and seek advice as the mother may abandon the babies or even kill them.
- Hoglets If they are out during the day without an adult or squawking they need help.
 There may also be others nearby so please check.

Remember hedgehogs do not get exhausted whilst trying to find somewhere to sleep or even sunbathe. They do not go to sleep on a pavement or by the side of a road. Any hedgehog found out during the day lying in the open is sick or dying. If you find one pick it up using gloves or an old towel to avoid infection and put it in a high sided box. You can offer it a drink of water but don't force it. Please don't offer any food. Take it to a

rescue centre or a vet as a last resort as soon as possible.

Top tips for now

<u>DO</u> Leave a dish of water and a dish of kitten biscuits out for them. (Wet cat and dog food is OK too)

<u>Do not</u> feed them Meal worms - they die an agonising death.

<u>Do not</u> feed them peanuts, raisins or dried fruit, bananas, fruit, bread, milk, eggs, sunflower seeds, raw meat of any kind including chicken, dog and cat treats.

Perry Hog Watch

Recently people have told me they haven't seen as many hedgehogs as in previous years so to try and gauge the level of hedgehog activity in Perry, please can you help me gather information by reporting to me any hedgehogs you may see out at night in your garden or elsewhere. I need to know where you saw it, date and the time which is important as they do roam about. In addition, any dead hedgehogs you may have been seen.



Dear Friends,

Every year the days seem to fly by, but this year with Easter being so early, it really seems that having only just celebrated Christmas and we are now looking to Easter.

Please look at all the services we have to offer for Holy Week including the annual Egg hunt and Good Friday Walk. We are also looking at finalising numbers for camp so please get your requests in as soon as possible.

So, March begins in the middle of Lent, and it is this time of year that we often try and give up certain things or give of ourselves in some way, because Lent leading up to Easter is a penitential season and associated with repentance and forgiveness. Society tends to see temptation as an external source of provocation rather than an inner struggle of right and wrong. In Jesus' temptations we see clearly temptations that all humankind has in common. The temptation to look for an instant solution. the temptation to take control, the temptation to seek instant power. The temptation is often hidden and subtle, hitting us at our most vulnerable moments. Then we arrive at the Easter Morning alongside those closest to him, experiencing the awe, the wonder and the disbelief of encountering that empty tomb.

Many wonder and many have doubts, not only about the resurrection of Jesus but of their own resurrection in the fulness of time. But we need to remember those words of a man in Mark's Gospel 'Lord, I believe. Help my unbelief.'

The disciples struggled after Jesus had been resurrected and Thomas refused to believe until he had seen Jesus for himself but their doubts were overcome as Jesus met with them, walked with them and broke bread with them, the reality of his living presence instilling a sure and certain faith in them that we know after he ascended could not be shaken.
