

#### GREAT STAUGHTON HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY



I think this is the best time of the year for gardens - particularly when there's been the ideal combo of warmth and rain. The brightness of new foliage is a delight and blossom is always surprising in its sheer profusion. No matter how many seasons you have seen there is such hope at the beginning of a new one; disappointments of the previous year temporarily forgotten.

This second week of May as I write, the beech hedges have just come out. They take their time but when the leaves unfurl they are magnificent.

Of course many of us have had to accept losses after the fierce frosts. Potted plants were particularly vulnerable, cordylines, yuccas and phormiums seem to have been devastated, my potted agapanthus and surprisingly a well established camellia and bay tree bit the dust. But things that had looked very sad have come back with a vengeance. We have no choice but to adapt to the new normal of unpredictability.

On the allotment the usual fortifications against animal attack are in evidence. I've invested in heavy duty fleece, fine netting and a lot of weights and so far the rabbits have stayed out. They usually love the raised beds and dig out all the contents. Not yet and hopefully not at all - fingers crossed.

I happened to be in London on the day of the coronation - not by design. I had an engagement booked long before the coronation date was announced. For anyone who hadn't camped on the Mall or wherever it was permitted there was no chance of seeing anything. We were all herded to the various big screen areas in the pouring rain. On route there were various floral displays being photographed - a large one featuring artificial flowers. However there were one or two stunning living walls, notably on The Athenaeum, Piccadilly. It seems impossible to manage vertical gardening like that. However on reflection it is like a massive hanging basket. Waterproofing the wall and arranging an effective watering system seem to be the key. I won't be trying it any time soon.

It seems ages until the next Horticultural Show but it will be over before the next edition of Life Magazine so keep this one and you can sort out your entry which you'll find on pages 32 - 34. Whether you are a grower, a baker, a crafter, a photographer, a preserver, an artist or a floral arranger, there's a class for you. It feels good to take part even if you don't win. Some people manage perfection and we are all in awe of them but all entries are welcome.

You may have noticed that 'creatures' feature prominently in the children's classes this year, marshmallow, vegetable, Lego or living and in keeping with this theme we've devised a creature/ big bug competition with a massive £50 prize! To enter you'll have to complete a form and pay £1. Your creature/bug needs to be on parade in your garden from 12th August 2023 and judging will take place on that weekend. Entries will be photographed and on display at the Annual Show at the end of that month. So get your creative head on. Please keep an eye on Facebook for updates.

Talking of creatures, I was thrilled to see a barn owl up close the other morning. It was flying low towards me along the road to Little Staughton - enormous wing span and beautiful circular face. I stopped and it kept coming until it spotted me and veered off. I used to see one up on the ridge above Garden Farm but that was years ago. Hopefully this one will stay in the area.

Our February meeting was held on Valentine's Day, but that didn't put off our lovely ladies and we had a large attendance. Our speaker was Lorraine Goody who gave us a writing workshop. We were each given a piece of paper and told to write the numbers 1 to 10 down the side and then to think about something that had happened during the day. We then had to write five words next to each number and that would be our story. After a few initial blank faces, we all wrote a few lines and some of the ladies read out their stories. They were all very good and all very different and it just goes to show what creativity can be achieved when we put our minds to it.

Lorraine told us that if you enjoy writing, to write for yourself as the chances of being published are very slim. She also told us that we each have a story to tell about our own lives and that stories should be written by us for future generations to read. She suggested we have a memory box to put things in, including our life story, and label it 'This is My Life'. It was a very enjoyable workshop which made us all think.

In March we enjoyed our Spring Supper. This was a new event on our calendar where our committee worked very hard cooking and baking to create a lovely meal for us all to enjoy. There were two chillies to choose from as well as jacket potatoes, tuna and salad. Not forgetting the delicious desserts. Thank you to our wonderful committee for all their hard work. After our meal we held our AGM where it was decided to now start our meetings at 7pm, beginning in April.

At the April meeting members welcomed Chris Smith who talked about 'The Beautiful South' of America.

Chris was assisted by his wife Sylvia. They are obviously seasoned travellers who have enjoyed visiting a lot of North America and Canada. They last visited our WI in 2018 and

talked about their trip to Canada. This time, their talk was about their trip in 2019 to the south of the country, with an emphasis on the popular music of the 1950s and 60s. Together with their slides they played a few soundtracks of the music which the south of America is famous for, starting with Willie Nelson's Freight Train Boogie.

Their trip began when they flew from Heathrow airport into Nashville, Tennessee. They visited the famous RCA Victor recording studios where such famous names as Elvis Presley, Roy Orbison and the Everly Brothers recorded their hits of the fifties and sixties. They visited Music Row, widely considered the heart of Nashville's entertainment industry and Country Music's Hall of Fame where Johnny Cash was inducted in 1980. They also visited the Grand Ole Opry, the world-famous home of country music.

Next, they visited Franklin, a lovely town in Norfolk County, Massachusetts with a strong connection to the American Civil War. They went to Memphis and took a trip on a river boat on the Mississippi. In Memphis, known as the 'home of the blues' they said they visited B.B. King's Blues Club where the food was outstanding! Elvis Presley's Graceland was also a memorable part of their trip. They recommended the purchase of the VIP tickets to anyone planning a visit there.

Sun Studios was another destination. Opened by rock and roll pioneer Sam Phillips in 1950 and where Johnny Cash, Elvis Presley, Roy Orbison, B B King and many others recorded their music.

Tupelo, Elvis' birthplace and where he began his singing in a gospel choir, was visited too. The small shack where grew up is still there. On they went, to Chattanooga and Atlanta. Chris said the people they met along the way were very friendly and the further south they went, the friendlier they became. An evening talk with slides from someone else's holiday, can be extremely soporific but Chis and Sylvia gave a very entertaining account of their trip.

Also in April, a few of us attended the Annual Federation Day, held this year in Peterborough at The Key Theatre. We all enjoyed browsing the stalls before the meeting began and tried our luck at the raffle – without any success unfortunately! Our Federation Chair, Phyllis Brooks, presided over the meeting and we enjoyed interesting talks. The first was by Vanessa Pool, who told us all about The Greenbackyard, a community garden in Peterborough. Vanessa was followed by Beth Elkins who gave an enlightening talk about ADHD and Autism in Girls. We found out that this is an area where girls are struggling to be diagnosed as boys were always thought to be the only sufferers, therefore, the diagnosis is now based on their symptoms, but girls present differently. After our picnic lunch we were entertained by Charles Hanson, the Auctioneer and Television Personality, who regaled us with amusing tales of his experiences in the antique world and also in the world of television. We all thoroughly enjoyed our day out.

For our May meeting we carried on the Coronation celebrations by all dressing in red, white and blue. The hall was decorated with numerous banners and Union Jacks; we sang the National Anthem and toasted King Charles III with a small glass of bubbly. We also held a special Royal competition where our members were invited to take along something connected to the Royal Family and our speaker chose her favourite to win a special prize.

Congratulations to Barbara Herdman whose antique miniature model of the Coronation Chair was chosen.

Our speaker for the evening was Sue Jakeman who spoke about the life and career of her aunt Peggy Spencer MBE. She told us how Peggy started life as a secretary and then during air raids in the second World War, whilst sheltering in Underground stations, she noticed how all the children would run around making mischief. She wondered whether dancing would help to control their energy and asked them if they would like to learn to dance. She learnt some steps of the Waltz from a book and taught them to the children. She then progressed to other dances and whilst teaching the children, taught herself to dance. Peggy went on to open up a dancing school with another lady.

In 1939 her ex-husband's brother, Frank Spencer, moved into the family home. (He eventually became Peggy's second husband.) He was a World Championship dancer and began teaching advanced dancing classes at Peggy's school. They also started a formation team which was very much in demand. They were asked to appear on The Generation Game; were photographed with the Beatles, and also performed for the staff at Buckingham Palace.

Along with Eric Morley, Peggy devised the television programme 'Come Dancing', she appeared on 'Surprise, Surprise' with Cilla Black and was honoured with the red book on 'This is Your Life'. Even after Peggy retired she carried on working, by mentoring an older generation formation team; coaching Anton du Beke (among others) and was even the Deputy Mayoress of Kings Lynn. Peggy's nephew, Michael, was also a champion dancer and is now a judge on Germany's version of 'Strictly Come Dancing'.

Sue's talk about her very talented family was both interesting and entertaining. It was also lovely to see the many photos that she passed around of Peggy and Frank and the many famous people they worked with. Our next meeting is on June 13th and is 'The Ukulele Singers'; on July 11th we have a talk entitled 'House of Spies' and then on August 8th we will be holding an afternoon tea (which will be in the afternoon and not the evening!). These meetings are always held on the second Tuesday in the month, now at 7pm at Great Staughton Village Hall. #### It's a TING Thing!

Tailor-made bus trips in West Huntingdonshire.

Ting covers St Neots, Cambourne, Sawtry and the surrounding villages. The service has been introduced to improve transport links for those living in rural areas, removing young people's dependence on parents for lifts and allowing local residents to lessen their reliance on cars

All you have to do is download the Ting iOS or Android App onto your phone or call **01223 433 255** and a bus will collect you from a bus stop in the village or other suitable stopping points, and will take you as required in the area.

Any one-way ride within the service zone costs just £2 for all adults. Children under 5 travel for free with an accompanying adult. Concessionary Bus Pass holders can also travel for free on the service.

Demand-responsive bus services are not fixed to a specific route or timetable - the movement of buses is determined by the demands of those wanting to travel. Using the Ting app, customers can hail a bus directly from their smartphone and travel where they like, when they like within the service operation times and zone.

The Ting bus service and call centre is open **7am-7pm Monday to Friday and 8am-6pm on Saturdays.** Ting does not operate on Sundays or Bank Holiday Mondays.







#### Dear Friends,

As we look towards the Summer months and hopefully better weather, I am sure many of you are out in your gardens mowing your lawns and fighting the ever growing weeds.

Many of you will be looking at some sort of break in the next few months. I just hope your holidays go more smoothly than mine did.

A friend and I were bound for the Galapagos islands and Costa Rica. It was to be the holiday of a lifetime with a stay on a luxury yacht whilst in the Galapagos islands.

We set off from Heathrow an hour late and when we arrived at Miami the pilot circled round and round but was unable to land because of a huge storm, he tried again and eventually flew us to Orlando to fuel. We stayed on the runway for a while and then when it was safe, we returned to Miami. We had been in the plane for fourteen hours. We had missed our connecting flight and so were put up by British Airways in a hotel we were told would provide us with all meals for the next day.

On arriving at the hotel and seeing the sign outside 'no soliciting' we realised that the hotel had no dining room and we had no cases We spent the next day in Miami airport and when we were about to get on the plane to Guayaquil we were

taken aside and told our tickets had been cancelled. That sorted out we flew to Guayaquil a day late, and on arrival saw our hotel in the distance so decided to walk.

In the morning, we decided to look at what we could do at Guayaquil as we were not going to Galapagos that day. We had sorted a few things out when my son rang up and said that we were to take off our jewellery and not go out as it was dangerous. An escort by the police was needed if anyone wanted to get money out and even taxes were dangerous.

We stayed in and waited for news of when we would get to the Galapagos but it was not forthcoming. After two days of incarceration in the hotel we decided we would be better going back to Miami, so that is what we did. Our Galapagos trip was not to be! WE were told by someone on the plane who lived in a gated community that if we had gone out to the park, we would have been 80% safe at the park because of the police presence but our taxi would have been ambushed on the way. There was a curfew from 9.00 pm at night until 5.00 am in the morning, that is how we stayed safe when walking to the hotel.

We did have a lovely week in Costa Rica but on my return home I realised I had the wrong case, it belonged to someone from Bogotá! So next day I was back in Heathrow doing a swap!

Life is a journey with both ups and downs

and sometimes there are more downs than ups, it is then that we need to remember that God is with us wherever we are and however we may feel.

And so I am ending this letter with an Irish blessing.

May the road rise up to meet you, May the wind be always at your back, May the sun shine warm upon your face;

The rains fall soft upon your fields And until we meet again may God hold you in the palm of his hand.
