In these days of fantastic energy prices it is also very pleasant to enjoy three hours of bowls in the lovely warm village hall.



hat does a hard frost do to our soil? Traditionally gardeners have welcomed a period of cold weather in the hope that it will kill off pests and diseases but things appear to be much more complicated. We are realising that healthy soil is teeming with microbial life - fungi, bacteria, nematodes, tardigrades, amoebas etc as well as the familiar earthworms, beetles, ants and other visible creatures. Scientists are gradually identifying some of the organisms but only a tiny fraction of them - perhaps 5%. Some micro-organisms will die but may leave spores or reproductive material in the soil which will activate when conditions improve. Studies of carbon dioxide emissions of forests in Sweden - where it gets pretty cold! indicate that some micro-organisms still function in freezing temperatures.

Soil condition is important for its resilience. The addition of organic matter increases the number of tiny air pockets in the soil. Working in a similar way to an eiderdown or polystyrene the air pockets reduce the heat transfer from soil to atmosphere - helping to slow down the cooling process and improving drainage at the same time.

I guess what is difficult for plants and organisms to cope with is a change to the norm. If a plant's roots are deep enough to avoid the frost layer then they are likely to survive. As the temperature in the ground drops plants release water from their roots before that water freezes, expands and breaks the cells apart. Sugars and salts in the roots lower the temperature at which the root water freezes. Astonishing! But if for the last five years there hasn't been a hard frost the plant might not have expended the energy to send its roots deep and if during the hot summer a lot of watering has been done, that may have encouraged the roots towards the surface.

All will be revealed later in the season not only the frost damage but last summer's heat damage. My hellebores have been decimated and I await the next revelation.

Talking of surviving freezing conditions brings to mind the wood frog - found in Canada and Alaska. It actually freezes solid for several months in the winter before miraculously thawing and carrying on as if nothing happened. It has been the subject of much research especially by scientists interested in cryonics - freezing the body after death in the hope of being brought back to life in a future when it is possible.

I had some tree work done this week and could not believe the transformation when ivy was removed. We are told that trees can co-exist happily with ivy but there must be competition for resources - and certainly for light when the ivy gets to the crown of the tree. A recent David Attenborough programme on plants illustrated that vividly. He showed a time lapse film of a lake in South America with plants gradually growing up. A late arrival on the scene was a form of water lily. Its leaves grew so enormous that they entirely covered the lake and killed everything else. Survival of the fittest in action.

Hopefully you will find the schedule for this year's Horticultural Show elsewhere in this edition. There's plenty of time to get organised, enjoy the excitement of growing, photographing, crafting or cooking. The Society's AGM will take place on Wednesday 1st March in the White Hart at 7.30pm. Please join us if you are interested. You will be most welcome.

ur final meeting of 2022 was our Christmas meal and instead of all of us squeezing into a busy pub or restaurant, it was decided we would hold it at the house of one of our members. Brenda very kindly volunteered her home and outside caterers were used to provide a very delicious and generous Christmas dinner. A good festive time was had by all – thank you very much Brenda.

The first meeting of 2023 was a very interesting and informative talk by Paul Wyer about Hedgehogs. Paul works for the Wildlife Trust and he began his talk by telling us about the Trust. It was formed in 1912 by Charles Rothschild (of banking fame) at Wood Walton Fen. The Wildlife Trust now manages over 100 nature reserves across the country, of which Grafham Water is our nearest in this region. The trust also helps landowners to re-wild their land. One of these projects has been Strawberry Hill in Bedfordshire where the farmer has been turning his 150 -hectare farm over to nature for the past 25 vears. The Wildlife Trust is now in the process of purchasing this farm which means the public will be able to access a previously hidden natural landscape.

Paul then went on to tell us all about hedgehogs. The bad news is that they are declining at a rapid rate. In the 1950s there were about 36 million hedgehogs in Britain but now there are less than 1 million, with 75% being lost since 2000. There are various reasons for this, including road kills and habitat loss - with farmers using pesticides there are not so many insects for the hedgehogs to eat and there are many new housing developments and roads which encroach on the hedgehog's environment. There

is also predation as badgers will eat hedgehogs if they are hungry as all the above also impacts on badgers and their food availability. However, there are things we can do to help, such as creating a wild corner in our gardens; making hedgehog highways in fences between neighbour's gardens and putting out water and meaty dog or cat food (apparently kitten food is ideal). Putting out bread and milk is now known to be harmful to hedgehogs, so is to be avoided.

We all enjoyed Paul's talk and he answered many questions at the end. We all felt more inclined to help hedgehogs and vowed to do our bit in our own gardens.

Our next meeting will be on February 14th where Lorraine Goody will talk about short story writing. If any ladies would like to come along and join us you will be made very welcome. Our meetings are always on the second Tuesday in the month at 7.30 pm at Great Staughton Village Hall. Below is our programme of events for the rest of the year. Fibre Broadband Update

For those that don't know me, I took over the role of 'Broadband Champion' after Roger Harding resigned from the role last year. Firstly a big 'Thank You' to Roger for his tremendous efforts over the years in gathering support and co-ordinating efforts with Cambs County council, BT and others to get improved broadband speeds to us all via the BT Openreach ADSL / VDSL legacy copper network.

Since taking over the reins, I have been communicating with potential alternative fibre broadband providers, also known as 'alt nets', who have been considering delivering full-fibre broadband services to Great Staughton, Perry and Grafham villages as an alternative to BT. A quick summary of potential providers is as follows:-

1). BT Openreach have no current plans to roll out Fibre to the Home (FTTH) within the next 5 years, so can be discounted in the near to mid term.

2) County Broadband marketed actively in the area last summer, and were looking to secure enough confirmed pre-orders for them to justify their business case to construct network in our area. You may have seen a number of County Broadband adverts in Life Magazine as recently as the last 'Winter' edition. I have contacted them a number of times for updates since the summer, but they have not yet confirmed any firm plans to progress, and it seems they have not met their order threshold, although this position may of course change.

3) Gigaclear were established in 2010 and have built full-fibre networks in a number of areas around the country, and are a relative newcomer to our area. Many of you may not have even heard of them, as they have not carried out any advertising or marketing. Gigaclear have a different business and funding model to County, and have already secured capital investment to proceed, and have confirmed to me very recently that they WILL be building fibre broadband services to our area very soon, and without the requirement for any pre-orders. Gigaclear will be sending out emails and letters to homes in the next few weeks, and will run a community online event in a few months time, once the network construction starts.

This following statement is from Gigaclear.

"Gigaclear works will soon be underway to bring full fibre broadband to several premises within the community of Great Staughton. This network will enable residents to access download and upload speeds of up to 900Mbps. To find out more and to see if your property is included, please visit www.gigaclear.com/ mycommunity We do not require a minimum sign up to build to your community so regardless if there are 1 or 100 people interested, Great Staughton will see the benefit of Super-Fast speeds.

Letters will be sent soon and then a community event will be planned to answer your questions. Please do keep an eye out for these as if you have not signed up for updates, the letter will say "the resident" and we would not want you to miss out on this information.

For more information on roadworks taking place in your community, please visit the website https://one.network which publishes the latest information on highways works for civil engineering. We look forward to seeing you soon"

So in summary, great news for the village, as we now have a confirmed ultra-fast broadband company willing to invest in our rural community, and we should all be able to access lightning fast fibre services within this year. Teams meetings, Zoom calls, software downloads and gaming will never be the same again!

As a footnote, my role as village Broadband Champion is to remain neutral with regards to any prospective FTTH supplier and without fear or favour, to report on the facts, and help or advise villagers the best I can.

Tailor-made bus trips in West Huntingdonshire.

Ting covers St Neots, Cambourne, Sawtry and the surrounding villages. The service has been introduced to improve transport links for those living in rural areas, removing young people's dependence on parents for lifts and allowing local residents to lessen their reliance on cars.

All you have to do is download the Ting iOS or Android App onto your phone or call **01223 433 255** and a bus will collect you from a bus stop in the village or other suitable stopping points, and will take you as required in the area.

Any one-way ride within the service zone costs just **£2** for all adults. Children under 5 travel for free with an accompanying adult. Concessionary Bus Pass holders can also travel for **free** on the service.

Demand-responsive bus services are not fixed to a specific route or timetable - the movement of buses is determined by the demands of those wanting to travel. Using the Ting app, customers can hail a bus directly from their smartphone and travel where they like, when they like within the service operation times and zone. The Ting bus service and call centre is open **7am-7pm Monday to Friday and 8am-6pm on Saturdays.** Ting does not operate on Sundays or Bank Holiday Mondays.
