What a warm November (so far)! Considering the extended and extreme heat of the summer, is this more evidence of global warming or simply a normal fluctuation of our capricious climate?

There are certainly lots of bugs about. I just took down a wall basket and disturbed an extended family of winged beetle things. I've no idea what they were but they made me feel itchy. I suppose I should be glad that life is thriving but my first thought was that a bit of frost would see them off. And if we're going to have frost please can it be accompanied by lovely bright sunshine.

The days are getting shorter and we have to accept that winter is here. Having recently visited the Arctic Circle where the sun was setting at 2.30 pm and due to disappear for several weeks I was most appreciative of the relative length of our winter days.

I've been collecting up leaves and putting them in bags for the slow process of harvesting some leaf mould. If the bag survives the necessary three years (not guaranteed by any means) and there has been enough moisture to enable the microbes to do their work, the reward is worthwhile - a crumbly soil enriching compost - apparently not very high in nutrients but excellent for improving soil structure. The main problem for the tidy minded gardener is where to store the bags for all that time. My apologies to the other allotment holders but mine litter my allotment.

Members of the Horticultural Society got together recently to decide on the schedule for next year's show. We hope to be able to share it with you next month so that there is plenty of time for everyone to plan their exhibits. In the meantime, I'm not going to mention the word, but enjoy the festivities!

Cancer can change the texture of our skin, the nature of our hair and strip us of our confidence so a fab team of volunteer Colour Analysts can help understand what looks good and help to pamper you - coffee, cake and chat included. 2 conferences a year at Huntingdon Race Course are held to keep people up to date with research, new treatments, nutrition and exercise etc. These are informative. supportive times and are relaxed and interactive

Some of us had heard of the HCCN but I don't think we knew quite how much fantastic work they do. Thank you to Andrea and Sandra for giving us the potted highlights and leaving us thankful for their commitment and smiles. 

The photograph of the tomb and coat of arms was duly taken and sent off and a few days later I received a photo of the coat of arms the society has created in honour of Colonel Walton

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A book about Staughton December 2018

n the chancel of the church, affixed to the wall opposite the impressive organ is a modest but elegant plaque commemorating the Reverend Richard Walter M.A. The plaque informs us that he was chaplain of HMS "Centurion" in Commodore Anson's expedition, and author of the well-known "Voyage around the World." This book "compiled from Papers and other Materials of the Right Honourable George Lord Anson." became an immediate best seller, and authors such as Patrick O'Brian and CS Forester have acknowledged their debt to this tremendous eighteenth century epic adventure of derring-do on the high seas.

It was a surprising turn of events for this modest cleric, described by a contemporary as "puny, weakly man, pale and of low stature," that he should take part in one of the most glorious failures in English naval history.

The purpose of the voyage was twofold: to develop trade with South America and the Far East, and, perhaps more importantly, to intercept and capture one of the many Spanish galleons carrying gold and silver from their colonies in Peru and Chile.

Walter carefully recorded his impressions of the storms at sea, the many deaths from disease and the encounters with exotic lands, skirmishes with unfriendly natives, and the sheer hardship of life aboard the *Centurion*.

In the climactic episode of the voyage, the Centurion at last sights the Spanish "galeon," Nuestra Señora de Covadonga on July 19 1743. The Spanish ship is not going to give up easily; it makes its presence felt with a salvo across the Centurion's bows. Anson, however, is not daunted and to assert his superiority, he employs a brilliant stratagem. With insufficient crew to man all the guns, he had two men to load the guns and the rest of the crew, in gangs of ten or twelve would move from gun to gun firing as ordered. In this way, the guns were being fired constantly, in contrast to a broadside where a devastating fusillade is followed by a pause as the guns are re-loaded, giving the enemy time either to respond or to re-load. Anson was also aware of another tactic of the Spanish which was to lie on deck when they saw a broadside being prepared, rising to their stations only when the guns were stilled. Anson's tactic of firing the guns in turn made it impossible for the Spanish to adopt their usual tactic.

A sudden squall of wind and rain just after noon obscured momentarily the "galeon." When it cleared, the Centurion had moved closer to the Spanish vessel and the sailors could be seen hurling overboard cattle and lumber. Anson decided to interrupt their task by a brisk whiff of grapeshot, although his original plan was to edge closer to the Spanish ship until it was within range of pistol shot. Gradually Anson manoeuvred the Centurion abreast of the galleon. keeping to leeward to prevent the Spanish boat from taking advantage of the wind direction to head for safety in the port of Jalapay, some seven leagues (some twenty-five miles) distant.

The *Centurion* cuts off the galeon's escape; meanwhile, marksmen stationed on the mast pick off the Spanish sailors one by one. After ninety minutes it's all over. Philip Suamerez, Anson's second in command, is sent over to the Spanish ship to assess the damage and accept the surrender of its captain, General Don Jeronimo de Montero. The scene on the deck of the Spanish ship is ghastly "covered with carcasses, entrails and dismembered limbs:" sixty-seven

Spanish sailors lay dead, eighty-four were wounded. English losses were one dead, and two more were to die of their injuries.

The spoils of this victory were considerable. Walter tells the story: *By this time the particulars of the cargoe of the galeon were well ascertained, and it was found that she had on board 1,313,843 pieces of eight, and 35,682 oz. of virgin silver, besides some cochineal and a few other commodities,* which, however, were but of small account in comparison of the specie. And this being the commodore's last prize, it hence appears that all the treasure taken by the Centurion was not much short of £400,000 independent of the ships and merchandize, which she either burnt or destroyed, and which, by the most reasonable estimation, could not amount to so little as £600,000 more: so that the whole damage done the enemy by our squadron did doubtless exceed a million sterling.

The Rev Walter was buried in Great Staughton and his family continued be considerable landowners in the village until well into the nineteenth century.

Perry in Bloom – 'Grants for Plants'



The Perry in Bloom – 'Grants for Plants' initiative will see several planters located and sponsored from central funds (over a three-year period) to enhance our village and make it 'Bloom'. The local enthusiasm for this has been commendable.

By way of an update; since the 15th September, when the Perry Village Open Evening took place, there have been some significant developments 'behind the scenes'. Because of that event 17 planters were adopted at various locations around the village, including the Baptist Church, many of them were taken on by local children.

Agreement was reached with Great Staughton Primary Academy that participation in the 'Grants for Plants' project would also accrue points towards the Children's University Scheme, which encourages external curricular engagement for those that have enrolled through their school.

One of the main considerations was the ability to maintain the planters and water them following such a record level hot summer, such as we have just experienced. To that end, sites were selected on council land based on accessibility to those who had expressed an interest in adopting and maintaining one.

The Parish Council met in October and agreed, after a tender process, to buy the necessary materials and commission the build of 18 planters for the project.

A local company, SCL Sleepers based at Great Staughton, were selected as the chosen supplier.

Top soil that will fill each planter, has been sourced from the A14 development site and liners have been kindly donated by Colin Beesley, the Village Handyman.

Some may have noticed that the construction process has commenced and is underway, thanks to the tireless efforts of Councillor Martin Wilson and Richard Winser.

This (and other updates) will be personally delivered to those adopting planters in the first phase.

Please do not 'adopt' your planter too early, work is still 'in progress' and we will communicate the developments and next steps.

Hopefully, we will await a very floral and colourful spring?!

Christmas is approaching! The time of year when we're enjoying a tipple with friends, cooking up festive feasts for the family and entertaining loved ones. With all the fun to be had it is easy to be distracted when cooking in the kitchen.

50 per cent of all fires in the home start in the kitchen and more than half of those are as a result of distraction whilst cooking.

We want to help ensure your festive cheer doesn't go up in smoke this Christmas by sharing our tips below for safe cooking over the festive season:

- Never leave cooking unattended
- Do not cook when tired or under the influence of alcohol, drugs or medication that makes you drowsy
- Regularly clean the grill pan and oven. Built up fat can easily catch fire
- Never leave anything cooking if you leave the house
- Do not leave anything flammable on or near the hob – tea towels, oven gloves and even washing baskets can catch fire
- Take care when using microwaves. Fires can start when people put food in too long.

• Oven chips or temperature control deep fat fryers are safer than using a chip pan. If you do use a chip pan, do not fill it more than one third with fat and turn the heat down if the oil starts smoking

• Fire can break out in household appliances so you should regularly maintain dishwashers, washing machines and driers, never leave them on if you go out or go to bed and register your appliances online to ensure you are made aware of any faults or recalls

• Have a working smoke alarm on each floor of your home. If it keeps going off when you are cooking it is probably in the wrong location or you may have the wrong type of smoke alarm

• Never take the batteries out of your smoke alarm.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF PERRY PARISH COUNCIL

Held on Wednesday 3rd October 2018 at 7.30 p.m. at The Perry Baptist Church

The meeting was opened by the Chairman, Nigel Noon, at 7.30 p.m.

18/113 Apologies for Absence: Ian Gardiner, Mark Fowler and Martin Wilson

18/114 Members Declaration of Interest on Agenda Items: None

18/115 County / District Councillor Update: County and District Councillors Update: DT reported that there were no specific issues concerning Perry, however he relayed a selection of news from across the wider Council: Universal Credit: Universal Credit is the new benefit being gradually introduced across the UK, replacing the following means-tested benefits and tax credits for working-age people: Income Support, (income-based) Jobseeker's Allowance, Housing Benefit, Child Tax Credit and Working Tax Credit. Universal Credit can be claimed by those in and out of work and includes incentives for people to move into work or to work more. This new social security benefit which combines six pervious benefit payments into one will be rolled out in the Huntingdonshire Job Centre area from 17th October 2018. **Stronger for Longer:** Huntingdonshire District Council's Active Lifestyles

District Council's Active Lifestyles Team, in conjunction with Cambridgeshire County Council and other partners including Cambridgeshire and Peterborough NHS Foundation Trust (CPFT) is helping to launch the Stronger for Longer campaign. It is aimed at encouraging older people to take up strength and balance exercises twice a week to reduce the risk of falling and keep them doing the things they enjoy. The Active Lifestyles Team offer RightStart classes across Huntingdonshire, which are graded exercises for older people wanting to increase their strength and balance. The exercises have the power to reverse agerelated loss of strength, bone and balance they can keep you fit, active and independent and doing what you love for longer. The classes are safe, fun, friendly and taught by qualified instructors. **Recycling metals:** The District Council has teamed up with the metal packaging manufacturing industry to launch the 'Make your metals matter' campaign here, which will reach all 76,000 households across the district. Making drinks cans from recycled material saves up to 95% of the energy, and greenhouse gas emissions, needed to make both aluminium and steel from raw materials. What's more, every time metal passes through the recycling loop the benefits are repeated, again and again and again! If all the metal packaging used in homes in Huntingdonshire each year was collected for recycling, it would save around 2367 tonnes of carbon dioxide.

the equivalent of taking over 501 cars off local streets for a year. Metal packaging found around their home, including:

> Drink cans Food tins (including pet food) Foil trays Empty aerosols Metal screw tops Foil wrap

Road Closures: A1 and A14 road closures continue to impact on local villages as cars and HGVs use local roads rather than the official diversions. There has also been increased reporting of speeding and damage to street furniture such as signs. Together with many residents, DT contacted Highways England to alert them to the issue of HGVs ignoring the official diversion and asked the Police to enforce the vehicle weight limits. This has attracted local and national media coverage, including ITV Anglia News, Cambridge News, Hunts Post and questions being asked in Parliament. Signage in some areas has improved, though the diversions are still ambiguous in places, leaving drivers confused or they are simply ignoring the official diversion routes. The National Road Haulage Association have been contacted, who suggest that poor signage is partly to blame.

Call Centre: DT previously reported that the new call centre menu-based system was being implemented over the summer. This has generally gone well with significantly less people being passed from one operator to another as the menu system encourages targets callers to the right customer services representative. DT will be in a position to report more information about these changes once it has had longer to settle in.

Parish Council Reserve Funds: DT also mentioned that favourable interest rates could be achieved by transferring Parish Council reserve funds to District Council accounts, whilst this was no means a 'pitch' rates of 3% (depending on circumstances) were considerably better that those being achieved by some existing deposit accounts. RW stated that the bank statements had not arrived to complete the Bank Reconciliation and Overhead Report for this meeting but this could be a matter for consideration at the next Parrish Council meeting. DT stated that the District Council were having to reduce and make savings of 1.6 million pounds from current expenditure. All easy options had been exhausted. Revenue generation and the reduction of service provision were now being considered.

18/116 Public Forum on Agenda Items:

A member of the public raised the issue of parking in East Perry and access to their property. DT advised on some options and potential courses of action. Details were obtained and will be forwarded to Ian Gardiner as this would fall under a County Council matter. The conversation continued to the wider debate of problem parking in the village. EP suggested that the Parish Council website be enhanced to host a village map with the Anglian Water Car Parks annotated. RW stated he would discuss this further with MW as the website development was now part of their shared portfolio. RW also undertook to establish the current position and get an update on the barrier system that Anglian Water hope to introduce, which will permit a pay for the duration of your stay charging scale for those using them.

18/117 Police Update: None **18/118 Approval of the minutes of the meeting held on Wednesday 12th September 2018:** Minutes approved as a record of the meeting DP proposed, EP seconded. RW asked for clarification from JH on the aspects of his portfolio he would adopt (as recorded in minutes – September meeting). JH stated he didn't feel able to take on Buckden Court Pond. RW undertook to get some initial quotes to commence the work but the logical grouping of this workstream was with the Village Work Party, retained under the workstreams assigned to JH. Agreement was reached for the workstreams to remain together. JH also stated that the decision of how the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme was defined had not been progressed. The Scheme needs to reconcile if it is a committee that falls under the Parish Council or a separate entity.

18/119 Matters Arising (not covered by Agenda items): Matters Arising (not covered by Agenda items): RW stated that during his initial meeting as Parish Clerk there had been some debate concerning the retention of notes made by Councillors during Parish Council meetings. At his recent Clerk training course, he had sought to clarify the position. As all Parish Council Meetings were public meetings, notes made during them were disclosable documents under the Freedom of Information Act. There are legal responsibilities that follow, including the statutory timescales for response, identification of relevant documents and legal remedy for breaches under the Act. Minutes taken by the Clerk are the formal public record of the meeting and are approved and seconded at each subsequent Parish Council meeting as a record of the event. Therefore, the practice adopted should be that personal notes taken are disposed of when the unconfirmed minutes are issued and circulated to the Council members. JH took exception to this and stated that recently he had read that there was nothing stopping a Parish Council meeting from being audio or video recorded by him as a Councillor. RW confirmed that was indeed the case, guidance had been amended twelve months ago to permit this. RW had undertaken some enquiries to establish if

the practice of recording meetings and potentially releasing them onto social media was in the spirit of the guidance or the amendment made to facilitate disability or similar circumstances: confirming that the amendment (as it is currently written) would be interpreted as permitting general recording, save for a discretionary condition concerning live time commentary. RW suggested however, if a Councillor insisted on recording a meeting the matter should be brought to a vote, irrespective of how an individual Councillor voted they would be expected to abide by the decision of the wider Parish Council. JH continued and introduced the scenario where a 'member of the public, for example, his wife' decided that they would attend a meeting and create a recording. RW replied that in those circumstances he would not personally consent to any personal infringement or recordings of him being uploaded (or potentially uploaded) onto the internet. Obviously, this would be a wider Council issue, but he would seek to challenge it. Guidance is guidance, which implies an element of discretion to follow and have regard to it, as opposed to a fact of law determined by a Court.

RW stated that he had issued a short article which had featured in the October edition of Life & Diaries magazine concerning overhanging vegetation intruding on public footpaths, pathways and roads. If the issue of overhanging vegetation persisted there could be follow up letters issued to householders after the November meeting.

18/120 2018 Perry Community

Recognition Award: RW explained that he had compiled communication features about the award ceremony that had been published in The Hunts Post and Life and Diaries Magazine. Both articles mentioned the route to propose a nomination which in turn, would hopefully attract more nominations next year.

18/121 Village Open Evening – 'Grants for Plants' (15.09.18) – Memorial dedication areas: RW stated that during the Village Open Evening both he and NN had been approached by a member of the public to consider an area in the village where you could dedicate trees. Councillors were invited to consider this between now and the November meeting. This would be placed on the agenda for discussion during the November

18/122 Perry in Bloom 'Grants for

Plants'. RW updated that 18 sites had been identified following the open evening, these were circulated on a redacted table. A total of 18 planters had been adopted, permission had also been agreed to site one of them on land owned by HMP littlehey.

Énquiries with Great Staughton Primary Academy had secured that children enrolled with the Children's University (CU), who had volunteered to adopt a planter would accrue points (time) under the CU scheme.

Quotes had also been obtained from three companies to supply the sleepers, these came in at $\pounds 21.85$, $\pounds 27$ and $\pounds 16$ per sleeper.

Various EU forms were being completed to allow the movement of top soil from the A14 development site.

Cost break downs for 18, 20 and 25 planters were circulated; these figures incorporated a three-year plant sponsorship voucher for the requisite number and a quote for plastic plaques to be fixed to each planter, identifying it and providing details of whom to contact for adopting in the future. Councillors were asked to vote on the number of units that would initially be commissioned, to appoint a supplier for the materials (sleepers) and to proceed with the initiative.

18 planters would be initially positioned

with the possibility of increasing the number if necessary at a future date. SCL sleepers would be appointed as the supplier.

The costs would be as follows;

18 x units = £864 (3x sleepers £16)

18 x £15 plant vouchers = £270 x

3 years = £810

18 x engraved plaques @£6.50 = £117

<u>Total £1,791</u>

SB proposed, and EP seconded the motion.

A debate took place concerning the use of plastic plaques or alternatively branding the details directly onto the wooden structures. For simplicity, the use of plastic plaques was considered easier.

JH circulated a Pie Chart he had compiled on his own initiative, titled Grants for Plants: Market Research which he suggested could be used to inform Parish Council marketing for similar future events. This would be discussed further at the November meeting along with any other 'lessons learnt' from the Open Evening Event. 18/123 The Budget 2019: RW stated that the budget for 2019/2020 is now due to be set and returned by the first week in December. RW will look to do this before the next Parish Council meeting. If Councillors had a matter that they required to be included in the budget they were asked to raise it with him, the budget will be included on the agenda for the November meeting for 'sign off'

18/124 The Next Phase Village Plan:

RW stated that consideration should be given by all Councillors in relation to instigating a group to compile the next phase village plan. Following the Open Evening there were a couple of people who had potentially shown some interest in involvement. There will need to be advertising and a further public meeting to gain the necessary momentum. RW suggested this as a standing agenda item. The Parish Council need to lead the initial stages of this and set it in motion. 18/125 Buckden Court Pond /Work Parties / Children's Play Facilities: The progress with Buckden Court Pond had been previously discussed, it will remain 'clustered' with related workstreams but RW will progress some initial quotes to get the more specialist tree work assessed and undertaken. JH requested matters that could be undertaken by the Work Party and mentioned that MW had previously discussed painting the Village Gates. RW suggested that all the benches also needed to be re-varnished as discussed and agreed at a previous meeting. JH presented an initial plan he had started to devise in relation to Children's Play Facilities. JH circulated a Pie Chart and 8 headings titled Playground 4 Perry. He updated on progress to date and stated all Social Media was complete. RW stated that he was unaware of a mandate to use social media and previously discussions concerning social media use were agreed to be taken back to the entire Parish Council. JH stated that he wasn't using it [social media] in a Parish Council capacity but his wife had formed a social media group. RW questioned this strategy, stating that it may be considered as circumventing and that the question posed in isolation was both a leading and a closed question. It would only garner support for the proposal made. The last survey that could be considered a reliable statement of 'Community Intent' was the Perry 2018 Village Plan Survey, reinforcing the importance of having the next phase plan in place. During that survey there was not a great need

identified for additional play equipment or a disparity of community opinion in the section Sports, Leisure and Culture (Do these adequately cater for the needs of local youth - Y 44.7% / N 55.3%). JH proposed a vote to establish if the Parish Council were in favour of progressing Children's Play Facilities. RW stated that in no way was he trying to discourage this, or any other initiative but this evenings meeting was not the opportunity to take a vote. At the 'Closed Meeting' on 30th August 2018 (JH reiterated he was not present) where workstreams were identified and prioritised, each workstream was identified, appointed an owner (and second Councillor) and categorised as a 'Working Group'. The exceptions being The Neighbourhood Watch Scheme which was still to define its status and the Children's Play Facilities initiative, which required a short briefing paper to set out and outline the intentions for a formal consideration at a Parish Council meeting. This was recorded in the public minutes 12th September 2018. Without this, the Parish Council were unable to determine what they were voting for. JH undertook to compile this (having enquired if there was a formatted report – which there was not) and place it on the agenda for the November meeting. RW stated he had liaised with Great Staughton Parish Council concerning their costs for recently installing play equipment and confirmed that the costs they published in Life and Diaries Magazine were capital costs.

18/126 Neighbourhood Watch Scheme: No update.

18/127 Speeding in the Village/ Radar Speed Signs/ Local Highways Initiative (standing agenda item): Now a workstream combined with Speeding in the Village and Speed Watch under Councillors David Prew and Martin Wilson. No Update.

18/128 World War One Commemoration – 27 working days to

go: RW stated that there were 27 working days to go before the Remembrance Service and formerly recorded thanks to Reg Weeks for making a wooden plinth which will be sited next to the tree and hold an engraved brass plaque in remembrance of those that lost their lives during the First World War. The Parish Council set a budget of £40 to purchase the tree, following advice as to what type would be most suitable. DP proposed, EP seconded. RW and SB to make arrangements to obtain the tree. Announcements to be made at the Perry Baptist Church Service, St Andrews Church Service, Village Notice Board and Village Store inviting people to join on the Village Green at 1200hrs Sunday 11th November 2018, where the tree will be planted.

18/129 Clerks Report:

RW reported that the second Councillor Surgery had been held 3rd October (ahead of the Parish Council meeting) but the County Councillor had sent his apologies at the September meeting. One member of the public had attended, their concern was initially addressed by DT.

Identification of Village Assets: RW suggested a proposal in relation to identifying the Water Tower Site, O/S Grid Ref: 1486 6679 as a potential asset of community value (within his portfolio). SB proposed, and EP seconded the motion.

MOJ Street Lamps – Gayness Park: RW reported that a series of street lights owned by the MOJ were not working, these lights illuminate an uneven path

at the back of Moat Lane. This had been reported to the MOJ directly and then to the Parish Council on Tuesday 14th August. MW had walked over to assess the situation and informed the Clerk that a series of lamps were out and most likely the circuit was down.

- On 23rd Åugust this was reported to Neil Thomas who in turn passed it to Paul Spencer. On 24th August, Paul Spencer tasked it to Victor Davis (Facilities Manager at HMP Littlehey). On 28th August a telephone call was held with Victor Davis, where assurances were made to get the situation rectified. On 23rd September, two further complaints were made which were brought to the attention of Victor Davis. 24th September, an E Mail was received in response stating that an Electrical Contractor would be tasked as there was an issue with the entire circuit and that they would consider erecting temporary barriers until the situation was rectified. On 5th October the street lighting remained defective.

Perry in Remembrance





At midday on Sunday 11th of November 2018, the Villagers of Perry gathered on the Village Green and took time to plant a tree as a memorial and act of remembrance to those who gave their lives during the First World War.

Once again, our thanks go to Reg Weeks for his phenomenal wood crafting skills and a memorial plaque stand, which will mark the 'Remembrance Tree 'position.

Mirrored by so many acts around the Country, Councillor Sheila Brighton said, "I am so glad we have done this, it may be a small gesture, but such a significant event should not go unrecognised by our village".

The 'planting,' timed to coincide with the conclusion of services at St Andrews Church and Perry Baptist Church was accompanied by a brief (three verse poem), read by three of the younger village residents. They all did extremely well!

A short poem was deliberately chosen, as the weather could not be determined at the time of making any of these arrangements to avoid everyone standing in [the predicted] rain.

In Flanders Fields; written in 1915 by a Canadian doctor and Lieutenant Colonel in the First World War, fighting and overseeing medical care in Boulogne, was the first poem to symbolically recognise the poppy as a symbol of 'Remembrance'.

Nigel (Chairman of Perry Parish Council) and Wendy Noon attended with two brass shell cases that were brought back from the Somme by their relatives. These were left to Nigel by his Grandmother, as he used to always play with them as a child. It was poignant that these now contained bottles of water which were used to water the tree in position, as opposed to an explosive charge from the battlefield.

It was also fantastic to see a Regimental Sergeant Major in full uniform who was able to entice and 'order' all those attending to regroup for a Village Carol Concert on Friday 23rd December - 1800hrs (Village Green). Please put a note in your diaries!

With the Wheatsheaf Public House beckoning a suitable retreat afterwards, it was understandably a village day to remember!


