ell, summer was a bit of a wash out, wasn't it! Thank goodness for the pile of books I had set aside to read!

The Great Staughton Book Club inevitably has fewer members turning up for the monthly meet ups during the Summer months. There are holidays for some, looking after the grandchildren for others, and then the inevitable last minute emergency to attend to but, even so, there were interesting discussions for those who could attend.

Our June book, 'The Meditations' by Marcus Aurelis, was mulled over in the garden with a glass of wine. We had an interesting discussion on Stoicism and 'religious' texts in general. The diary is at least 1800 years old, never meant for publication and ponders on such things as duty, forgiveness, strength in adversity and the best way to live life.

In July, we read 'Unsheltered' by Barbara Kingsolver. Written in 2018, this was an easier read although it did shift from the present to the past focusing on two families who had lived in the same house. In many ways, the book was about the house: Can it be saved? Is it worth saving? What does it mean to those who live within her four walls? But its characters are also interesting and their resilience and compassion during periods of change and upheaval are realistic and moving.

The August book, 'The Mirror Crack'd' by Agatha Christie, is, in my humble opinion, a well-constructed cozy crime story. It's easy to read but full of twists and turns challenging us to guess who?, what? and how? before the denouement. What we learn from Christie is to never, ever, underestimate little old ladies!

## GREAT STAUGHTON HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY



I'm writing this on 10th August, the best day for outdoor spinach sowing according to vegetable growing guru, Charles Dowding. Sorry you're now too late for this optimum date but you can be ready next year! Sowing earlier results in plants going to seed but if put in at the right time the spinach can develop enough to establish so that you may enjoy a crop right through the winter. I'm going to give it a go.

You already have a clue to what I was doing in late July - attending a no dig day course at Homeacres, Charles Dowding's amazing plot. I'm already a convert, as were the other 15 or so enthusiasts. It was a challenge getting there because it is in deepest Somerset - an idyllic spot but it seemed to be on a flight path of some sort. There was some intrusive aeroplane noise.

The first surprise was that it is actually quite a small site - only an acre or so of which about a third is under cultivation. Charles gets an enormous amount of produce from his plot and ensures that there are very few unplanted areas. He uses succession planting and is very precise in the timing of seed sowing so that he has small plants ready to go in at the appropriate time.

He is also meticulous in making a case for his methods. He showed us beds, established 10 years ago in which he'd planted the same combination of vegetables, from the same batch, at the same time but into ground prepared in different ways. One plot was dug using traditional methods and incorporating compost, the other was a no dig bed which had been top dressed with the same amount of compost. Over the seasons he has weighed the produce cropped from each plot and has been able to show that he consistently gets 5-10% more produce from the no dig bed. Other advantages of not digging apart from expending less energy, are that there are fewer weeds, drainage is better, the soil does not compact or get muddy etc.

The thinking is that by digging you are interfering with a complex ecosystem involving all sorts of creatures and fungi which can act together to break down organic matter and interact in a symbiotic way with plant roots. He disputes the commonly held belief that plants roots need crumbly soil to get under way and claims that they grow better when the soil is firm.

Another thing to avoid in the no dig situation is artificial fertiliser which is thought to interfere with the natural balance of the soil micro-organisms.

The drawback for me in trying to establish and maintain no dig beds has been getting enough compost. We were shown Charles's very impressive compost bins and of course he generates lots of raw material from his own site which he can later return to the soil. He puts everything in his compost - including weeds (even bindweed!) and weed seeds! As long as the compost reaches 55%c the seeds will be killed. A compost thermometer may be the ideal gift for some.

It's not so easy in a smaller garden or household so it can be a bit expensive to start off if you have to buy large amounts of compost but once established only an inch of compost has to be added each year (preferably before Christmas).

There are numerous YouTube videos on making no dig beds, compost and all the other techniques Charles employs but it was great to see him in the flesh. He was very approachable and interested in input from the group.

Another, more local, expert will be on hand at the Garden Talk in Great Staughton Village Hall on **Saturday 7th October at 7:30pm**. Martin Roberts who is Head Gardener at Howbury Hall near Renhold will be sharing his wisdom on propagation. As well as feeding your brain with good stuff, the £10 ticket includes Sue's magnificent buffet and a drink, alcoholic or otherwise. Put the date in your diary!

## <u>GREAT STAUGHTON</u> <u>W.I.</u>



In June we were entertained by the 'Sparkling Ukes', a group of players from the USA. There are usually 28 members of the group, but for our evening there were 13 players who were led by Katriona. We were shown the different types of Ukelele-the Concert Ukelele, Tenors, and Baritones. There is also a Soprano, which is the smallest Ukelele, but it wasn't being played that evening. The group were also joined by a bass guitarist.

The mixed group of men and ladies sang and played a variety of different music from DollyParton's 'Jolene' and Rod Stewart's 'Maggie May', to 'Bring Me Sunshine' – a Morecambe and Wise favourite. We were all encouraged to join in with the singing and a very enjoyable evening was had by all.

Roger Leivers gave us a very informative talk entitled 'Pink Gin Percy, Bonzo and Crommie' in July. This was all about Farm Hall in Godmanchester when it was requisitioned in 1942 by the RAF and became a 'spy school'. The 'Pink Gin Percy' in the title was Squadron Leader Cautley Nasmyth Shaw who was given the nickname because of his love of the tipple! He was the person in charge of the operation. 'Bonzo' was Wing Commander Bruce Bonsey who was second in command and 'Crommie' was Cautley's dog who was an expert at spotting a recruit with stress and

would stay by their side until their mood improved. Many messages sent back from the frontline would often include the phrase 'love to Crommie'.

It is now recognised that the dog helped people with PTSD and he has been given a posthumous blue plaque by the PDSA.

We were informed about the many brave men and women who risked and lost their lives during the war. The people from Farm Hall were involved in Operation Sussex where they were sent to Normandy a couple of months before D Day to find safe routes, safe house and landing zones. We all owe these people so much.

Roger Leivers has written two books all about this subject and donates money from the sales to various charities. So far he has raised over £33,000, since 2015. We were all amazed, interested and humbled by his talk.

In August we rang the changes and instead of our usual evening meeting we met in the afternoon at our President's house for afternoon tea. All the committee contributed to the food and we all enjoyed a variety of finger sandwiches (crusts off, of course), quiches, cakes, and cream scones. The bad weather meant we had to stay indoors, but that didn't dampen our spirits and we all enjoyed the company, food and copious amounts of tea. Thank you to all the committee for all their hard work with preparing the delicious food and a special thank you to Barbara for also

letting us invade her home.

Our September meeting will be our annual harvest supper where the committee will again be cooking us a lovely meal.

On October 10<sup>th</sup> Les Blignaut will be giving us a talk entitled 'Kanjanji Project Zambia' and on November 14<sup>th</sup> our speaker will be Linda Brown who will be hosting our evening called 'The Merry Makers'.

These meetings are always held on the second Tuesday in the month, now at 7pm at Great Staughton Village Hall.

First, some sad news. We lost our lovely member Marion in May after a short illness. We will miss her cheeky smile and gentle manner and have arranged for a donation to be sent to St John's Hospice – this is now our charity for this year. Marion, you weren't a member with us for long but we will miss you nevertheless.

Ramsey Abbey Garden has a long and varied history which I would love to tell you (I wrote 8 pages of notes) but I doubt our esteemed editor would ever speak to me again so I'll give you just a few snippets from Jane Sills' delightful visit to us in May. Fellow WI member (Ramsey), Jane is a volunteer at the garden and goes in every day to water the greenhouses and, I don't doubt, just soak up the overall delight of the place.

Ramsey Abbey was founded in 969 by the Benedictines and the 15 century gatehouse is still there. In the 10th and 11th centuries it was one of the richest abbeys with a huge library, the Cromwells lived there, as did the Fellowes family and Sir Edward Bloor, then Diana Broughton bequeathed it in 1937 'to education'. And in 2004 a charitable trust was formed with a £25,000 Heritage Lottery Grant and the work began.

The gardeners (all volunteers) began by restoring the 1920s Apple Tunnel, moving the entrance away from the school and renovating the greenhouses using recycled bricks. The garden was completely overgrown with brambles, buddleia, selfsown trees, ivy – it was a terrible mess. And, of course, when all this stuff was hoiked out, the weeds came back with a vengeance. They found some interesting stuff though, particularly a Victorian Mulberry tree which had cuttings taken and some of the wood used for sculpting. The tree still crops black

mulberries which is made into pots and pots of jam.

Path clearance took ages and the

carpets donated by a local shop filled 5 skips when eventually taken up! Wrought iron 18th century gates were repaired by a local blacksmith and in May 2013 Bunny Guinness was there for the official opening. There is a posh eco-toilet, a sundial in the centre (money raised by Ramsey WI) and a general restocking of largely local flora. Jane made us laugh when she said 'And remember that just because something is heritage doesn't mean to say that it's good!' so the gardeners have tried to plant local varieties of plants and fruit because they are tried and tested in this area – the dahlias give a spectacular display, there are over 900 varieties of salvia, they have the only Stone Pine in Cambridgeshire and lots of the crops are grown to be made into jams and chutneys and pickles.

So if this muddled wiggle through my eight pages of notes has whetted your appetite, then you'll need to visit www.ramseywalledgarden.org. Jane was enthusiastic and very knowledgeable and I really haven't done her talk justice. Perry WI are visiting the garden as our August meeting so watch this space!

Moving on to June, we had a visit from Liz Davies, curator at St Neots Museum for the last 11 years. She does the ghost walks in winter and the town walks in summer so you may know her. The museum is in the old Police Station and Magistrates' Court so was the epicentre of Law and Order in St Neots (1860-1989) – however, Liz began her talk with good old Adam and Eve, and those pesky 10 Commandments. Crime is, as we will all recognise, whatever people decide and make a law against and this understanding of good and evil is embedded in each worldwide culture to this day. So,

Trial by Ordeal goes back 4000 years, Henry II established juries of 12 local knights to sort bother out. Richard II (he of Lionheart fame) commissioned knights to preserve the peace so that he could go and fight various people he didn't like, then in Tudor times Manorial Courts (when the Lord of the Manor was the boss) were beginning to fade and the parishes were growing in power. They were responsible for appointing Scavengers who were the Constables. They were appointed annually and as it was both dangerous and voluntary, it was a job that not many particularly wanted (they were paid 4p in 1701). They authorised the use of the whipping post and the stocks – the last one in St Neots was for Jeremy Tutt of Toseland in 1824. Caxton Gibbet was used of course and in 1815 the death penalty was available for over 200 offences. Judges were reluctant to use the death penalty and transportation was therefore increasingly used to Australia and Tanzania - Liz mentioned the words Braverman and Rwanda which gave us pause for a few moments. Pickpockets who stole less than 5 shillings were transported; to steal more was the death penalty. Oh and by the way, when put into those awful full-body cages and strung up on the gibbet, the person was already dead.

In 1780-90s the climate was in a dire way and famine was rife so on 30 July 1795 wheat being transported to market was intercepted at Southoe Turnpike by some hungry townsfolk. The Riot Act was read the next day and the sensible people of St Neots dispersed because of fear of soldiers in their town.

After the Napoleonic Wars, the returning soldiers created havoc (needing jobs etc) but the authorities still had to maintain law and order including looking after the prisoners of war – there were 7000 at Norman Cross. Eaton Socon still has its lockup - I'm not sure if it's still in working order but I expect if you live next to one of the pubs on a rowdy match

-night you may yearn for its reinstatement. And in 1857 Huntingdon even had its own Police Force though the town didn't want it because the rate-payers had to pay for it. In that early Victorian period, there was actually a form of popular justice when folks simply got together to show their displeasure and in Eynesbury in 1878 the husband of a wicked stepmother had his effigy burnt on the village green to show the other villagers didn't approve.

St Neots had some famous crimes – in 1865 Suzanna Hollis (aged 21) was murdered by her husband for telling him to stop drinking He was tried (twice) did 6 months and then went on to a long marriage and a large family! And then there was the world famous St Neots Poisoner. In 1898 one Walter Horsford managed to kill several people with strychnine. He was hung in Cambridge jail even though 3000 people signed a petition for a reprieve.

The advent of photography really helped and we saw examples of criminals from the Habitual Criminals' Register: Ruth Tack stole 2 oranges; James King stole 5 new eggs. You'll notice that these 'crimes' were often crimes of poverty and hunger but hard labour or picking oakum or sewing mailbags was the punishment. Harsh, unfair and savage.

Liz's talk was fast moving and interesting - starting with the story of law through our country's history and finishing with specific stories from our area. All I can say is thank heavens for our present (by no means perfect) system of law and order and the ongoing conversations we have at local, national and international levels about what crime is and what it isn't. Many thanks Liz, you entertained us and made us think about those people from the past and also to count our own lucky stars.

July couldn't have been more different as Geoff Gilbert came and regaled us with tales of butchery of a different ilk! Geoff started butchery when he left school in 1967, just before his 16th birthday and now he and his family have three shops. His first placement was at a butcher's and slaughter house, and he cried for almost his whole first day towards a first pay packet of 4 pounds. 2shillings and sixpence (probably enough for one really decent burger these days). One Christmas they had to slaughter and pluck loads of geese and thought they'd done them all. However, the next morning, they stumbled across a survivor who they named Lucky. Lucky old Lucky was given a reprieve and went on to live for another 3 years. Lucky old goose!

In 1971 he went to work for Hellets in Kimbolton and learnt to make left-handed sausages. He only discovered this sinister fact when a righty asked him why he was making them lefty! He told us about making 16 pigs' worth of sausages which is around 2 tonnes apparently. Wow. You needed to have a slaughter license which cost 5p - the stamp to send it in was 10p! He was at Hellets for 20 years.

In 1991 he made the jump and opened his own shop in Great Staughton. A big risk and tough getting started but he and Eileen went from strength to strength – he couldn't have done it without her, a proper team.

5-10 weeks after a local Tesco opened Geoff was asked about its impact on local butchers and was pleased to say that there was very little as people stop off with him for their meat on the way home from Tesco! The opening of the A14 had a bigger impact as there was less lorry traffic.

It was fascinating to hear about old cuts which have fallen out of fashion and that the main difference between butcher and

supermarket meat is that the supermarkets may purchase good quality meat but they do not look after it well enough after slaughter, often sending it straight to be processed without hanging it with the preconception (wrongly) that this maximises weight when it simply means that the meat shrinks on cooking.

His son Andy now runs the enterprise and is making a success of it with a shop in St Neots and one recently opened in Buckden. Andy only told Geoff he was thinking of opening the St Neots shop a week before he actually did, to stop Geoff from 'whittling' – now there's a nice bit of headology. And COVID helped the business with people not wanting to queue in supermarkets – isn't it good to hear something positive from those troubled times.

Geoff told us that his favourite cuts are brisket, ribeye steak and apparently there's some very nice Mexican Kyiv in the shop at the moment.

And I leave you this month with a conundrum. How Many Legs Are There On A Lamb?? Answer at end of this report ...

So there we have it! May, June and July couldn't have been more different for Perry WI, could it. In August we are off to Ramsey Walled Garden, September is D'Oyly Carte and October is Metal Detecting! Our Programme Organiser a complete gem.




**Is it political?** No, your role is to act on behalf of your fellow residents. Politics simply doesn't come into it.

# Site Assessment consideration by Great Staughton Parish Council: The five potentially suitable sites

The five potentially suitable sites were considered by the Parish Council.

After a significant discussion and taking into account the results of the poll at the Parish Assembly two sites were considered more appropriate than others for the following reasons.

#### NP1 Brook Farm:

This was considered the most suitable site and had the most support by some distance from the Parish Assembly. The Parish Council felt it had the best possibility of delivering a viable site with a new suitable NHS facility, affordable housing, and car parking. It was felt there was a potential gain in terms of removing unsightly warehouse type buildings and improving the conservation area. The site had access at the rear to open farmland which means that it has the opportunity to be developed in sympathetic way to its surroundings, it can accommodate potential requirements and deliver the need for an NHS facility.

It was also felt the site would have potentially good access to the B645 to accommodate the housing and NHS facility. Access from this site to local facilities the school, bus stop, playing field and shops is all easy.

#### NP4 The Green:

This site was considered the most appropriate second site for development. It was not felt it had the capacity to deliver an NHS facility but did have suitable the capacity to deliver affordable housing. Its location lends itself to complimenting the current village area and is included in the NP village envelope. The site has good access to all village

facilities but the increased pedestrian traffic should be reflected in improvements to B645 road crossings. Access on to the B661 would need to be well designed, but it was not seen as a major issue.

## NP5 Cage Lane:

This site although complimenting existing development had more difficult issues with access. Cage Lane is a narrow road with a narrow access on to the B645. It has current parking issues as some houses do not have driveways which limits width even more. There are few options for widening as houses are close to the road at various points. Additional traffic along this road from an additional potential 12 properties would add significant issues.

### NP7 North side of The Green:

This site has potential reasonable access to the B661. By being on the North side of The Green it was felt less desirable as residents would have to cross the B661 to reach the footpath. It also was felt less desirable to develop on this side of the B661 in terms of continuity of the village envelope.

#### NP 8 The Green:

This site seems too small to make any significant development possible. It also is separated from the rest of the village

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
