

'I'm so glad I live in a world where there are Octobers.' L M Montgomery, Anne of Green Gables

I spent most of my time in the long hot days of summer finding shady corners in which to read. Whether beneath the dappled shade of the old London Plane or the gazebo, I have been nowhere without a book or two within arms' reach. I suspect the same will be true in these Autumn months, although I am already hankering for the days when I can relight the log fire.

Our summer reading proved interesting and educational. We have had lively conversations about characters, plot, length of book and historical intrigue.

Our June book, 'Empireland', by Sathnam Sanghera, is a fascinating account of the history of the British Empire and especially its impact on the UK. Whilst we didn't think it was an easy read, it prompted a lot of discussion and one comment was that every young person should read this at school. It also included an extensive bibliography for further reading.

In July, we read 'Portrait of an Uknown Woman' by Vanora Bennett, a fictional (but well-researched) account of the residents in the home of Thomas More in Tudor times. Although full of history, romance (including some bodice-ripping!) and intrigue, it lost pace in the middle.

Our August book, 'Agent Sonya' by Ben MacIntyre, is a biography of Ursula Kuczynski, a housewife, mother and Russian spy. Often taking her small children with her when making a 'drop', Agent Sonya went unsuspected of espionage by MI5 because they didn't think a housewife could do such a thing! An interesting read

GREAT STAUGHTON HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY



How wonderful to have had a proper summer for once or is it the beginning of the end of the world? It has certainly been a challenging season for things horticultural. I'm sure, like me, you wished you had acted on all the advice to change to drought resistant plants.

I always remember my surprise on first arriving in Phoenix, Arizona in late summer 1980 at how green it was. Phoenix is a large city sprawling across the desert in western USA. There were acres of golf clubs and lawns everywhere despite punishingly hot dry conditions. It soon became apparent that constant irrigation was essential to sustain such unnatural planting and one could often be caught out when an automatic watering system started up. Even back then there were moves to persuade home owners away from grass towards desert planting which could be absolutely stunning. Are we heading in the same direction?

My no water regime at the allotment has been enforced by the fact that the numerous storage tanks around the site are resoundingly empty. I allowed seedlings a bit of water to get started in the spring then they were on their own. So far the courgettes have been most successful, giving a reduced but steady crop. (A bit of a relief actually!). French bean plants stayed very low to the ground but have produced quite well. I don't expect much from the runner beans. They are covered in flowers and small beans but I doubt if they'll swell much. Sweet corn and cucumbers look very sad and the raspberries keep coming but they are small and not very juicy. The strawberries died a while ago.

But the tomato plants have been extraordinary. Huge bushes have flourished without a drop of water. They were planted in the soil conditioner that I was dismissing as barren in my last piece. I usually grow them at home in a grow bag which is constantly watered and fed so this has been a revelation. The tomatoes I've harvested have been delicious.

As Anglian Water keep telling us, the aquifers are still at normal levels so all I can think is that there is water under the dry crust and the plant roots are going deep to get at it.

Sadly you are not going to see pictures from the Horticultural Show until Christmas time. That's the downside of a quarterly publication. It will be interesting to see what the standard and quantity of produce is after this record breaking summer.

We've brought forward the date of the garden talk this year. It will take place on Saturday 24th September at 7.30pm in the village hall. The speaker is Roger Wood of the Beekeepers Association. Hopefully he will give us some tips on encouraging and sustaining bees in our gardens. I've always been fascinated by the bee dances which allow bees to communicate to each other where food sources are. Tickets are priced at £7.50 and this includes refreshments - wine or soft drink and a delicious buffet. You can get tickets from Horticultural Society members or from Gilbert's the Butcher. See you there

Pamela Tasker gave us a fascinating talk about the history of buttons. Pamela used to work in the fashion industry and supplied buttons to major outlets, so she is very experienced with everything concerning buttons. She informed us that buttons first appeared in the eleventh or twelfth century on men's clothes and were largely used as decorations. Ladies' clothes used to be laced or tied in place, and it wasn't until around 1860 that buttons began to be used on women's clothing.

It was really interesting to discover all the different materials that buttons have been made from, such as horn (Dorset buttons were made from rams' horn), bone, ivory, cloth and pearl. We have all owned clothes with buttons covered in material, but never knew the tests that were carried out to make sure the dye didn't run from the button onto the clothes.

Pamela also mentioned the sayings we all use that wouldn't have existed without buttons, such as 'bright as a button' and 'button your lip'. Who would have thought a small, but vital item we all take for granted could have such a rich and interesting history?

At our June meeting we welcomed Lynne Souter-Anderson, Doctor of Psychotherapy who values the therapeutic use of clay. Lynne is the author of the book 'Touching Clay, Touching What?' and other titles. She talked about her background as an art teacher and how her career took the direction it has. Giving the theme 'Garden', Lynne provided our ladies with the opportunity to model a piece of clay. Those who wanted to were able to take away their finished clay model. All

members agreed it had been an interesting and enjoyable evening.

Our meeting on Tuesday, 12th July was Paper Flower Making with Pat King from Buckden. We had all the paper and tools required and we attempted to make a dahlia. Some turned out looking like a flower, others perhaps not so much, but we had fun and enjoyed helping each other out when we couldn't work out what we had to do! Our next meeting on August 9th will be afternoon tea in Pat's garden in Great Staughton. Thank you to Pat for allowing your garden to be used! We will also be meeting up for lunch on 23rd August followed by a visit to a Buckden garden. Our September meeting will be our annual Harvest Supper and in October we welcome Peter Gout who will talk about tracing your family tree while in November we will be looking at, and learning about, different crafts. So, if any ladies would like to join us and join in with the fun and outings, we meet on the second Tuesday in the month at 7.30 pm at Great Staughton Village Hall and you will be made very welcome. Affordable Housing in Great Staughton

As a resident of Great Staughton you will probably have seen the properties being built on the B661, the road towards Perry.

They are now expected to be complete and ready for occupation in January 2023.

Local people or those with a local connection will have priority in accessing these properties.

There are 12 properties in total.

9 properties are for social rent.

- 3 x 3 bedroom Detached houses
- 2 x 2 bedroom Semi-detached Houses
- 2 x 1 Bedroom flats
- 2 x 2 bedroom bungalows (Minimum age 55 or proven medical need)

3 properties are available for shared ownership

- 2 x 2 bedroom Semi-detached houses
- 1 x 3 bedroom Detached house.

It should be noted that applicants can only apply for a property which meets their assessed needs - i.e. a single person can only apply for a one bedroomed property; a couple with two young children might only be able to apply for a two bedroomed property. This will be determined in the process.

If you are interested in any of these properties (or you know somebody who is) registration must be made with Chorus at

<u>CHG.Registrationofinterest@placesforpeople.co.uk</u>

Once you have done this you need to decide if you are interested in Shared ownership or renting. If you are in the position where you are unsure whether you are able to afford a shared ownership property but would like to try, you should follow the process for shared ownership. However, if you would like to be assessed also for a renting property (in the event you are unable to purchase a shared ownership property) you are strongly advised to follow the registration process

for renting properties as well, as otherwise you could be too late.

The process for obtaining a rented property

You will be required to register your housing need on Home-Link via www.home-link.org.uk
Once you have registered,
Huntingdonshire District Council (HDC) will assess your application and you will be given a priority banding between A (being the most urgent) through to D (for those assessed as having a low housing need). Your application will then

be set to a live account and you will be given log in details so you can bid (express an interest) for the properties you are interested in.

This process can take several months so it is strongly recommended you do this as soon as possible.

The new build homes in Great Staughton are likely to be advertised on Home-Link in November 2022, so to be considered for these homes you must be fully registered and have placed a bid for them by the time the advert closes. Allocation of the properties on closure of the advert will then be based on the agreed policy which gives priority to people living in the village, have lived in the village, have relatives who live in the village, or work in the village. This applies initially to Great Staughton and then to Perry and then to surrounding villages. The process of allocating the properties will be administered by Chorus but will be strictly based on the agreed detailed allocation policy. It is recognised some applicants may achieve more than one of the local criteria but it will be the highest ranking factor which will determine the sequence of applications. It should be noted that applicants will have to provide evidence to Chorus of the category of local connection. Local connections will take precedence over housing need so do not worry if you have been assessed as band D by HDC.

The process for obtaining a shared ownership Property

You are required to register on the Help to Buy agent for the south of England. https://www.helptobuyagent3.org.uk/ This must be done by the cut-off date of September 16th 2022.

Your ability to purchase part of the property will be assessed. If it is deemed you are financially able to purchase you will then be placed on a list which will be assessed against the local allocation conditions. It should be noted Chorus have identified a potential suitable mortgage provider which is important as the properties are leasehold for around 125 years.

Information

A final decision on sale price and rental levels has yet to be made at the time of Life going to print. There will be a leaflet circulated with this information in Great Staughton, for those in Perry the information will be provided to your Parish Clerk.

It should be noted that the minimum ownership share is 25% and the maximum is 80% for the Shared ownership properties.

The speaker in June was Julia
Harrison who told us about the ACWW
or "Associated Country Women of the
World" which is a charity supported by
the WI. Despite sending a representative
to the UN this charity is, in my opinion,
not widely known about.

It was started in 1929 when 24 countries came together to discuss the daily lives of women around the world. Mrs Mariorie Watt was the first leader of this" not for profit" collective of women committed to improving the lives of rural women. Now the collective includes many large countries such as the USA, Canada, Asia, South America, Southern Africa, Europe, the Far East, South Pacific and of course the UK. It's structure is similar to the WI in that each area has a President and a board of trustees. It's aims are also similar in that it wants to improve the lives of women by setting up work possibilities or improving the living conditions in remote villages where maybe there is no water or sanitation and women have no means of supporting themselves.

The very first group started by making a list of ideals to live by and in 2019, some 90 years later, 11 resolutions were passed including:

- Action on Climate Change
- The Use of Plastics
- Production of Textiles & Clothing

Who can join the ACWW?

Countries, at the moment there are 75, also groups such as the WI and individuals, currently about 1000 people.

How many people has it helped?

14,183 women and children have been supported in IT. Women have been helped into self-

employment and over 7,000 have benefited from water projects.

How does the ACWW choose the projects?

The charity raises money by awarding grants to support small projects dealing with the inequalities in women's lives. These are mainly concerned with education, nutrition & health, access to water & sanitation.

What are your recent projects?

Revolving loan scheme in India, training women in accounting.

Milch cow scheme which funds the cost of a cow so that a woman can earn a living selling dairy products.

Action against climate change.

Helping to establish gardens for growing vegetables.

Art therapy in Romania.

How can we help?

By raising money from "Women Walk the World".

Collecting small change for "Pennies for Friendship"

It's a TING Thing!

Tailor-made bus trips in West Huntingdonshire.

Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Mayor Nik Johnson is promoting a new on-demand bus service for the area called **Ting**.

Ting covers St Neots, Cambourne, Sawtry and the surrounding villages. The service has been introduced to improve transport links for those living in rural areas, removing young people's dependence on parents for lifts and allowing local residents to lessen their reliance on cars.

All you have to do is download the Ting App onto your phone or call **01223 433 255** and a bus will collect you from a bus stop in the village or other suitable stopping points, and will take you as required in the area.

Any one-way ride within the service zone costs just £2 for all adults.
Children under 5 travel for free with an accompanying adult. Concessionary Bus Pass holders can also travel for free on the service.

Demand-responsive bus services are not fixed to a specific route or timetable - the movement of buses is determined by the demands of those wanting to travel. Using the Ting app, customers can hail a bus directly from their smartphone and travel where they like, when they like within the service operation times and zone.

The Ting bus service and call centre is open **7am-7pm Monday to Friday and 8am-6pm on Saturdays.** Ting does not operate on Sundays or Bank Holiday Mondays.


