Rain! I've been longing for it for months. The garden has been like a desert. And yet after the first wet (and cold!) day I'd had enough. Logic tells me that it needs to rain like mad for weeks to replenish the water table but I just want to see the sun again.

I remember people planning holidays in the UK in the past - I mean 45 years ago! Wimbledon was a sort of introduction to summer and the time to risk making a booking. One of the weeks was usually warmish but that was by no means guaranteed. It's an indication of how much we've come to expect warmer weather. We feel a bit cheated if we haven't had a few heat waves by then - and this year we have - what about Easter? It's all forgotten as soon as the rain starts.

It has been sad to see blossoms drooping under the weight of water - poor peonies and poppies. It's going to be sad too when the army of weed seeds germinate!

Do you ever imagine turning up treasure in your plot? I'm always hopeful of a small cache of gold coins as I'm digging over a new patch. I just heard a talk about the archeological digs facilitated by the A14 road works. The first amazing thing is the scale of the investigations. Six hundred archeologists have been working along the length of the road

works and work started in 2016. They have unearthed tons of fragments of pottery (including some complete pots) and an equal weight of animal bones. They do use diggers to get down to the interesting layers but then a lot of the work is done by hand. They have discovered round houses, barrows, pits and boundary ditches; stone age remains, Roman remains, Anglo Saxon and medieval remains - an abandoned Anglo Saxon village outside Brampton but in all their tireless digging they've only found one gold coin. I can't even remember what era it was from but it had an image of a horse on one side and was blank on the other.

So my expectations have been modified.

Their most recent work is in the gravel pits of Fenstanton where they have been finding prehistoric animal remains - bones of hairy rhinoceri and mammoth tusks. It's just incredible what is under our feet!

Getting back to the present you will find the Horticultural Show schedule in this edition of Life on page 20, and the entry form on page 18. You have a few weeks to cosset your marrows and your dahlias before the competition begins. The show is on **Saturday 24th August.**

Thanks to everyone who made a scarecrow for this year's competition. My apologies if you took notice of last month's life article in which I said it was to be held in July. It happened in June. Oops!

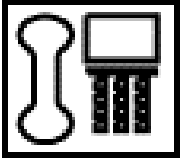

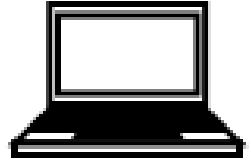

Telephone : Do you suffer from nuisance calls ? Then may I remind you of BT Call Protect that will stop the majority, but not all as spammers are constantly finding ways of beating it.

For more detailed information just enter "BT Call Protect" in your web browser or ring 1572.

Broadband : Back in February 2017 I wrote the following :-

"I mentioned before that due to the above average uptake of fibre in Cambridgeshire there was a £6.3M clawback from BT which will be used to help those people in areas that are difficult to reach. In order that the village gets its fair share of these funds I would like to hear from people that are unable to achieve download speeds above the Superfast threshold of 24Mbps.

Even more important is the need to hear from those at the extremities of the village, where I know for a fact, some are only achieving as low as 5Mbps."

I received no response to this request to try and help those with poor speeds hence no funds were allocated to Great Staughton. So I am making the same plea as there MAYBE an opportunity again as more clawback has been received from BT. **Some come on all those that are unhappy with your speeds, you have nothing to lose and you MAY stand a chance of improved speed by letting me know what speeds you are getting.**

GREAT STAUGHTON VILLAGE BOOK CLUB

Our May read was “And the Ass Saw the Angel” a first novel by Australian musician and singer Nick Cave. Originally published in 1989 and was the “Time Out” magazine Book of the Year but was chosen as our read for the month as it had sat on someone’s shelf unread for a long period of time.

Set in an isolated but deeply religious community in the American South it is very much a gothic novel heavily influenced by Biblical Scriptural references. Having said that this book is not for the faint hearted or those of nervous disposition.

It tells the story in first person narrative through the eyes and non -voice of Euchrid Eucrow a mute boy born into a very abusive and dysfunctional family. He and his family are shunned by all as outcasts. His life is contrasted with Beth, who despite her own strange start in life is accepted into, and brought up, by the whole town. His life spirals further and further out of control until eventually Euchrid explodes with rage, a reaction with disastrous impact on the whole community.

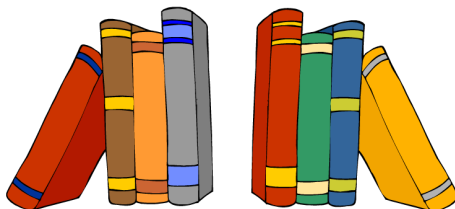
The book group were united in their dislike of this book but it did

provoke much discussion, which is the purpose of a group such as ours. Topics were aired were:- the style of writing and impact of the first person narrative, the use of religious and offensive words and imagery to tell the tale, and the way society reacts to differences. Despite written in the late 1980’s some of the subject matter is very relevant to today;- abuse within families, substance abuse, hardships in poor economic communities and how societies perceive / react / deal with differences in individuals.

Overall I wouldn’t recommend it as comfortable read but was definitely thought provoking.

Next month our book is The Children Act by Ian McEwan.

We met at the Baptist Church this month for a talk on the travels of Chris Hall to the Arctic. Chris has been to the Arctic on several occasions and is passionate about the area and the wildlife. He travelled to the Svalbard Islands (at the top of Norway) which is 78 degrees North according to his tee shirt!

haul their enormous weight out of the water onto the ice (memories of trying to get out of the swimming pool flash before my eyes!). Of course the males use their tusks for fighting in the mating season but then they are blokes!

Firstly, he made us aware of the difference between the Arctic and the Antarctic.....Arctic has no land, just sea ice.....Antarctic is a land mass. Unfortunately the Arctic is melting rapidly and probably in our lifetime will no longer exist.

Chris was at great pains to let us know that when he goes on these trips it is purely to observe and not interfere with nature. The bears do get very hungry and will scavenge for anything. They are agile but not too fast so can't rely on chasing skills to catch their food.

Chris went to check out the wildlife. Reindeer, Walrus, Arctic fox, Arctic hare and of course Polar Bears. These cuddly teddy's are the largest of all bears and related to grizzly's and brown bears but much bigger. Mums put on about half their body weight when pregnant (know how that feels!) about 200lbs in fact. Generally they have two cubs but only 40% of cubs survive today compared to 70% 20 years ago. Chris says this is mainly due to global warming and with the rate of the ice melt there is a possibility that the bears may disappear altogether.

I'm sure I speak for everyone when I say thank you Chris for a very interesting and informative talk.

Next month we are in the Sailing Club where a children's author will be telling us a story!

Our topic for June was on the subject of Lung Functioning a talk by Melanie Bryce who is a Chief Physiologist working at Hinchingbrooke Hospital. Melanie originally trained as a midwife in Dundee before deciding that was not a role for her. However she had enjoyed the neonatal resuscitation side of the job and therefore went to University followed by (Royal) Papworth Hospital to train as a Healthcare Scientist in Lung Functioning. She has worked in the role for 10 years

Mums are in total command of the polar bear cubs, Dads don't stick around much. Probably just as well as they are partial to a cub if they get hungry.

It must be very tempting to give the bears food when the ships have so much, but of course this wouldn't help in the long run and may even contribute to their demise if they get used to being fed.

Kittiwakes are another Arctic favourite.

part of which is to educate people about the Anatomy of the Respiratory System, hence the rather fetching T Shirt Melanie was wearing, and she had designed, to demonstrate where the lungs etc. actually are in the human body. Said T-shirt was then used to practically demonstrate how the different components / organs fit together and enable us to breath.

Melanie explained the different protective measures of the body; - cartilage cilia, mucus, cough reflex, diaphragm and what happens when these fail or are damaged. She said that the respiratory system (unlike the heart) is very unforgiving and slow to heal therefore even 1 cigarette can do damage particularly as nicotine is more addictive than heroin and she is therefore very passionate about helping people to quit smoking. Lung disease currently costs the NHS £11 billion Melanie went on to explain the different tests that the Community Respiratory Team she works for can do and the conditions they treat e.g. Chronic Obstructive Airway Disease (COPD) Asthma, Cystic Fibrosis Bronchiectasis and Pulmonary Fibrosis etc. Referrals can be from the Primary Care sector (i.e. GP's) and part of their role is to reduce the need for Consultant appointments by diagnosing and then helping patients manage their Respiratory conditions. Melanie finished by talking about the different Asthma inhalers available and demonstrated the correct way to use them and a spacer for the best outcome. All in all a fascinating and instructive talk. If you wish to know more or learn

how they can help then google Respiratory Team at Hinchbrook.

The next meeting is **Tuesday 9th July 7.30** p.m. in the village hall and our topic is "The History of The Royal Oak, Hail Weston".

We will be joined by members of Kimbolton WI so please feel free to come and see what we get up to as guests are always welcome, and of course being the WI there is normally cake!!

Public urged to stay fire safe in hot weather

Cambridgeshire residents have been urged to stay fire safe when outdoors this summer.

With temperatures forecast to be similarly high to last year, fires in open areas of land can easily spread and become out of control.

Group Commander Paul Clarke, head of community fire safety at Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service, said: "We want to help ensure that people enjoy the sunny weather while it's here safely. High temperatures and dry areas of land can be perfect conditions for a fire to spread. Something as simple as not stubbing a cigarette out properly, or using a disposable barbecue on grass, can start a fire that can develop quickly."

There are seven simple steps we urge residents to take to help prevent an outdoor fire:

- Ensure cigarettes are completely out
- Do not throw cigarettes out of

car windows onto grass verges or vegetation

- Put disposable barbecues on bricks, do not place directly on grass
- Do not leave glass bottles lying on the ground, the sun's rays reflect through the glass and can start a fire
- When camping, do not leave campfires unattended and make sure it is completely out before you leave it
- Use barbecues on a hard, flat surface, away from grass, shrubs or fencing
- Talk to your children about the dangers of starting a fire.

A Book About Staughton July **2019**

The Handasyde Memorial

Thomas Handasyde, the father, was born c. 1645 and, like his son Roger, lived in 'Gaines Park' in Great Staughton. Thomas spent his life as a professional soldier, serving his sovereign, William III, in campaigns in Ireland and Flanders. The summit of his achievements as a military man was undoubtedly his appointment, in 1702, as governor of Jamaica, then a key territory in the expansionist British empire.

By the time he was appointed governor, Handasyde already had a distinguished career in the service of king William III. It began in 1688, the 'Glorious Revolution', when the Catholic James II was deposed in favour of the Protestant William of Orange who took the crown in that year as William III. The brutal removal of the Catholic king of England did not escape the attention of the Catholic kings of France and Spain, and a bitter 'Nine Years' War' broke out between these kingdoms. One of the first tests of strength for William III was the rebellion in Ireland, when an army sympathetic to James II was defeated at the Battle of the Boyne in 1690.

The campaign in Ireland must have enhanced Handsayde's reputation, for he was promoted to major and in 1697, he joined the regiment commended by Colonel John Gibson which was ordered to Newfoundland

to re-capture the fort of St John's, a stronghold of the French in Canada. The regiment arrived to discover that the fort had been destroyed and abandoned by the French. St John's was an important strategic base and Gibson ordered his men to set to work rebuilding and strengthening the fort. Unfortunately for his plan, provisions were insufficient to maintain a garrison of several hundred soldiers, and Gibson therefore took the decision to withdraw the bulk of the regiment, leaving the work of rebuilding in the hands of Thomas Handasyde and 300 soldiers, describing his comrade-in-arms as 'a good, worthy man, of courage and conduct, who has served the King 24 years.' Handasyde successfully accomplished his mission, although 'worthy man he might have been,' he did have to report, on his return to England in 1698, that, in the course of the work, no fewer than 214 of his men, out of a total of 300, had perished due to illness and malnutrition.

The experience did Handasyde's reputation no lasting harm, and on 20 June 1702, he was commissioned Colonel of the 16th Bedfordshire Regiment of Foot, and at the same time appointed lieutenant-governor of Jamaica, following the death of the previous incumbent, Major-General Selwyn. During the reign of Queen Anne, the 16th Regiment remained on the island, to thwart any hostile attempt to secure this strategic outpost. described as 'one of the best infantry officers we have,' Handasyde also demonstrated a humane side to

his character during his governorship. The British navy was engaged in what turned out to be an ill-fated expedition against the French-held port of Plaisance in the bay of Placentia in Newfoundland. A naval squadron was sent out under Vice-Admiral Grayson to capture the port and the fleet put in to the harbour in Jamaica to take on men and provisions. It did not go well. Handasyde responded to Grayson's demands. He quickly ensured that sufficient provisions were efficiently loaded and assisted the Vice-Admiral with the embarkation of the men, but at this point Handasyde grew increasingly angry at Grayson's brutal methods in conscripting men as soldiers. Handasyde was not alone in his disgust; ship-masters and merchants were moved to write to the governor to protest at Grayson's high-handed attitude. Handasyde immediately wrote directly to Grayson to express his displeasure and when this had no effect, he passed on all the complaints in a despatch to the Council of Trade and Plantations in London.

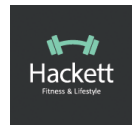

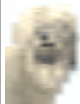

19/35 Public Forum on Agenda Items:

NN confirmed that parking for the Chapel would again be available next door at the GWC carpark.

19/36 To approve the Minutes of the Meeting held on Wednesday 7th March 2019:

The minutes were proposed for approval by SB, seconded by NN.

19/37 Matters Arising (not covered by Agenda items):

- **Buckden Court Pound** – EP reported we have £250 for a life belt station at Buckden Court Pond. It was queried if we needed Buckden Court's permission to erect the station. EP to find out. It was suggested that we purchase the life belt and have the station built to house it. NN suggested a plaque be placed on the station thanking the donor of the funds.

- **Time Bank** - Initial interest in this scheme had not shown the requirement for a £2,500 contribution for two years to gain matched funding. The finance is required to pay for a co-ordinator for the scheme. MF to contact the organisers confirming an interest but informing them of the prior lack of information on the costs involved. MF to query whether this cost will be required every year.

- **Perry in Bloom** - Soil for the village planters is due to be delivered on Friday 3rd May. MF has sent a photo of the entrance gate to the parking area with instructions as to where to tip the soil. MF to send out an email asking that the soil is collected asap and reminding

everyone about Vouchers for plants.

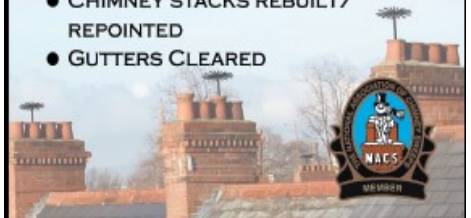

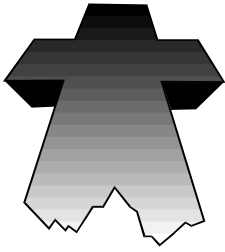
