

But it is worth the time and effort to discover what happens to a short-sighted woman called Vincent.

Another year heads for the exit and there have been winners and losers in the garden as ever. We haven't had such a wet autumn for a while. What a delight it is when the sun manages to break through. Dark and damp is nobody's favourite.

you'll find a reminder of high summer in the photos from the 2023 horticultural show from pages 23 to 25. It won't be long until the society's 60th anniversary which will be in 2025. The society exists to put on the show and because it makes a loss each year, other events are held to fund the deficit ie the plant sale on the last Saturday in May and the annual garden talk in the autumn. Through organising and taking part in these events the members of the society get to know each other quite well, they get satisfaction when things are successful, a warm feeling that they have contributed and often some excellent cake! We had salmon, chicken, ham, quiches, salads and salad potatoes to name just a selection of delights. This was all accompanied by a choice of cold drinks, both alcoholic and non-alcoholic. Afterwards there were a variety of desserts to choose from, including apple pie and strawberry tiramisu. A huge thank you to everyone for your hard work.

After we were all sated and everything had been cleared away, we played handbag bingo – with no one quite remembering the rules! We still had a very good time playing and the winners (my table) were rewarded with sweets which we shared with everyone. The committee had also very generously provided us with a free raffle and I must have been sitting on the lucky table as all the winners were seated at my table! Everyone had a fantastic evening.

In October we began the evening by celebrating the 90th birthday of one of our lovely ladies who was presented with a beautiful bouquet of flowers accompanied by a tuneful rendition of 'Happy Birthday To You'

Les Blignaut, a husband of one of our members, was our speaker for the evening and he began by thanking us for inviting him to be photographed for our calendar and produced two oranges and a camera from a bag! He was obviously referring to the 'Calendar Girls' and got everyone laughing – a great way to start a talk. Using slides to illustrate his subject, Les spoke about the Kanjanji Project Zambia and told us how he retired from being a trustee of the charity, but when the Managers Dr

Lourie and Gisela Ferreira left the Project, he returned and remains a trustee. The project provides medical care for the local community, and offers help to

local women and children, especially with their education. Les explained how the 40 acres of land on the Zambeze river was given to Cecil Rhodes by the British and he gave it to the charity. It has no running water or electricity. Money is raised in various ways including a fund set up in remembrance of Mari Simon, a young girl who was killed on the river by a speedboat. So far over £100,000 has been raised in her name. There are also volunteers, including Paula from America who has helped to build houses. Les also collects items in the UK to be shipped out to Zambia, including polo shirts, shoes, bras and laptops.

Les informed us of a young orphan called Kelvin who was helped by the charity and gained a degree in Mathematics. We were shown a short film of Kelvin explaining his life and how important 'Uncle Les' was to him. He now runs the charity with his wife, Hope, and they have a baby girl. It was heart warming to hear how things have come full circle. Kelvin has started a small agricultural farm at the charity, growing produce which the community use themselves and also sell at market. This was a very interesting talk.

For our November meeting we will be entertained by 'The Merry Makers' and in December we will be going out for our Christmas meal. Our meetings are always held on the second Tuesday of the month, now at 7pm at Great Staughton Village Hall. Great Staughton Neighbourhood Plan

The Neighbourhood Plan (NP) for Great Staughton has now completed its first formal stage – the Regulation 14 consultation. Leaflets were distributed throughout the village, walk in sessions were held, and emails sent to all statutory consultees and other potentially interested parties.

I thank everyone who sent in their responses. The responses have been recorded and are now being analysed, where appropriate and necessary, changes made to the NP. This will take a few weeks to complete. The revised plan will be put on the website and Facebook.

The revised NP will then be presented to HDC for the next stage, the Regulation15 consultation conducted by the District Council. This then precedes the presentation to the examiner, subsequent referendum, and the making of the plan. Once 'made' it becomes a necessary document to be considered in any planning application.

Unfortunately, Historic England have suggested, and the District Council have concurred that a Strategic Environmental Assessment is necessary on the Brook Farm site identified in the NP. This will have to be completed before the Regulation 15 stage can commence. The process can take up to 4 months, but we will do everything possible to expedite it.

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

his new history of the village was serialised over many months on the Parish Council website and now the book is available, amongst other outlets, on Amazon. The book was launched in September and was featured in the Hunts Post. Sales so far have been very encouraging. And how was a highly respectable Victorian lady involved in the horrific Crimean war? There is lots more. Every chapter highlights a particular era and how people from this village played a significant role in England's history.

Highlights for most of us included the myriad local varieties of apple positively dripping off the branches (yes, there were many mixed metaphors too!) and the amazing number of salvias and dahlias in full bloom creating magnificently coloured borders. So many ideas for our own gardens...

On her visit to us, Jane told us about the fruit and veg which the volunteers sell and many purchases were indeed made along with jams and chutneys, and you may have noticed the odd member with purple fingers to show those who had scrumped some mulberries —

We were told that the gates were locked but it has to be told that one of our members (who shall remain nameless – we know who you are) managed to sneak out into the Abbey next door and take some photos – sshhhhhh, not a word!

Our visit ended with a seat in the midst of this tranquillity, a cuppa and a huge wedge of cake – now that's my sort of visit!

And September rolled round to see Mike Muncaster giving us a musicfilled talk on the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company. Mike first encountered Gilbert and Sullivan as a 'horribly miserable' 11-year-old boy at boarding school. It was HMS Pinafore and he was hooked for life. He began by handing out libretti and informing us that he would punctuate his talk with recordings of the greats and that we were absolutely allowed to join in. I think a few people may have hummed along to one or two, I know I did having been in a sensationally bad production of Patience at Prescot Grammar School for Girls several hundred years ago. Ah the roar of the greasepaint, the smell of the crowd ...

Gilbert and Sullivan were instrumental in the formation of Richard D'Oyly-Cart's opera company in 1879, and until it

eventually closed in 1982 the productions were ever the same. Gilbert as Director was insistent there was no deviation from what he wrote. Later his son and daughter established The Tradition and it continued thus, even down to the Principles teaching their successors when due to retire. With one exception, The Tradition held all that time - the exception was when a word which is now known to be derogatory and nasty was allowed to be changed – but it took them until 1946!

Gilbert was the quarrelsome, irascible one and Sullivan was the calm worrier but they were a team of great success. Mike played us a recording – the only one extant of the original Principles – from 1902. It was crackly and very 1902 (if you know what I mean) but to listen to something so old gave us a shiver – what history!

Gilbert wanted actors who could sing so he would audition an actor and if he approved would send the person to Sullivan to see if they could sing! The intended consequence of this is that the diction is extremely good and it had to be as some of the songs were horrendously fast. Mike played us a clip to illustrate the clarity needed. If you're in any doubt just google Gilbert and Sullivan fast songs!

Mike is a true fan and if you fancy it, he's doing a10 week course at Buckden Towers on Gilbert and Sullivan's Life and Times.

I asked him if he ever performed and he said he'd 'performed in The Mikado once, and thereby lies a tale...'!

October saw us hearing some more history but more of that later. David Metson was given a metal detector 10 years ago and hasn't looked back since – actually he has looked back, way back to a Neolithic axe-head, a veritable shedload of buttons, buckles and several hundred coins (Roman, Medieval, Tudor etc), including a 30BCE Mark Antony denarius (allegedly made from Cleopatra's silver).

David is a gentle and engaging speaker who showed us pictures of the finds but had also brought a table full of boxes of finds including some of his treasures. Talking of treasures, we learnt about the Treasure Act of 1996 and what actually constitutes treasure, which includes being over 200 years old plus 10% gold or silver, or 'anything significant' (just so all bases are covered). The Act was amended in 2023 to close a few loopholes but David is a responsible treasure hunter who always gets the landowner's permission and very often gives any finds to the landowner to keep the artefacts in the family. He called those who hunt at night without permission Nighthawks – which is a romantic name for criminals, really.

It is the story behind the finds which is most fascinating – why was the Victorian sweetheart brooch broken (which incidentally he found in two halves over a year apart) - was it lost on a romantic walk or did she turn against her love, break it and throw it at his feet - 'But Felicity, my darling, you are the love of my life!', 'No Rupert I saw how you were you talking to that hussy!'; a horse harness pendent which had 1320 on it along with the three mitres of the coat of arms of the Bishop of Norwich – why was an knighted emissary of the bishop passing through this field in the middle of nowhere all those years ago? A small collection of five Elizabeth and Mary (ie Tudor) groats which would have been a significant loss to the owner as that was a week's wages.

Not all finds are unsolved mysteries however. David found a dog tag on a local WWII American air base, tracked down the airman back to America. The airman had died in 1980 but David sent the dog tag to his very grateful son.

One of the most beautiful artefacts that David brought was a tiny golden ring – it wouldn't even fit on my little finger. It is barrel shaped and hollow with exquisite markings all around it (all the more astounding they would have been made without magnification in mere natural light). David is convinced that it is a hawking ring, put round

the leg of the hawk as proof of ownership. Only problem is that it has no name on it so no museum wants it. If they can prove it's a hawking ring then it will be worth over £2,000.

Ah yes, I mentioned 'hearing' history again this month. David showed us a box of crotal bells hung around the necks of livestock to keep track of them. When cleaned carefully (usually just water and a toothbrush) very often the ball inside the bell is still there and they still work. David's wife said that the first one he found is now a decoration on their Christmas tree and many did indeed have a very pleasant sound.

23/69 Apologies: Parish Councillors Nigel Noon and Emma Prew's apologies were approved. County Councillor Ian Gardener's apologies were received.

23/70 Report from District Councillor: SC delivered his report. EA asked if SC had heard anything regarding HMP Littlehey, SC hadn't but will make enquiries (see also item 73/76/a).

23/71 Appointment of a councillor: Motion proposed by EA and seconded by JS. Chris Jones was appointed as a councillor of Perry Parish Council by unanimous vote of the council.

23/72 Open forum for public participation: Arrangements for daffodil planting (minute ref. 23/6/d) were discussed. Action: ES to liaise with Ann Jackson. The possibility of replacing some of the trees on The Drive was discussed. Action: ES to contact HMP Littlehey. The Platinum Jubilee oak planted by Anglian Water has died. Action: ES to contact Anglian Water to ask if it will be replaced.

23/73 Councillors' declarations of

interest for items on the agenda:

EA declared an interest regarding item 23/81/e.

23/74 Minutes of the previous meeting: The minutes of the Perry Parish Council meeting held on 13th September 2023 were approved as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

23/75 Clerk's report

23/76 Parish / village matters: HMP Littlehey developments - the possible expansion and lack of consultation with or information to residents, and the associated upset and unease were discussed. Action: ES to write to the Governor.

Overgrown garden. Action: Contact to be made with relevant resident.

23/77 Events Working Party: JS provided a progress report. Summer 2024 event - the £250.00 deposit to secure Banquet Inn Bars was approved. Action: ES to book Banquet Inn Bars. The earmarking of £250.00 for a band was approved.

Great Staughton Parish Council

Great Staughton Parish Council held a public meeting on Thursday 9th November in the Village hall attended by many residents. As a result of representations made at that meeting, the following response was sent to the developers.

It has also been sent to our MP, Councillors and the Parish Council has asked James Duberly and Lorraine Goody to represent us on the inter Parish group opposing the development.

East Farm Solar Park

Response to Developer

Great Staughton Parish Council would like to make the following response to the proposals for solar Farms in Cambridgeshire and Bedfordshire.

The Parish Council's response has been informed by a meeting of a large of number of residents on the subject.

There is an overall opinion that the Solar Farm development is excessive and disproportionately large and too close to villages. The Parish Council is generally very supportive of renewable energy projects as it has demonstrated in its support for projects such as the solar farms on Staughton Moor which are neither intrusive or excessive.

The Parish Council would make the following points in relation to its

Objections:

- The siting of the panels on site C in Gt Staughton would be north facing, which is suboptimal and would involve more land mass than necessary elsewhere (to prevent shadowing over the solar panels).
- The proposed location of East Park site C would destroy a very important view across the Kym Valley and of the village of Great Staughton including views of the ancient Manor and the Church. The footpath across the ridge on the Moor affords these special views. The Solar Farm would destroy this view and screening would only make it worse as the view would not be visible because of the screening.
- The walks designed around the village footpaths 23, 34, and 40 would be seriously impacted by solar Farms together with bridleway 7 into Hail Weston Parish. These walks were specifically designed in the 1990's with the co-operation of the landowners, Parish Council, and the community to provide easy access to the countryside for the residents of the Parish.
- The Parish Council has also identified in the exhibitions that there is a sub-station and battery depot within site C. These details are not reflected on the distributed literature nor on the website. We would like precise details of what is proposed in terms of these buildings in terms of size and shape.
- The area covered by Site C if

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covered with solar panels may well not have the same ability to absorb rainwater as the current agricultural land. This could result in faster run off in water on to the river Kym and then downstream. This area is already subject to regular flooding resulting in properties being flooded near B645 bridge over the Kym. The road has also been closed on a number of occasions resulting from flooding. The Parish Council believes that these issues may well be exacerbated by the potential increased run off from the solar farm.

- The loss of important reasonable quality agricultural land is exacerbated by the North facing aspect.
- The Parish Council feels that the solar farm site C impacts on the

heritage aspects of Great Staughton exemplified in the Conservation and listed buildings area along the Highway and the Causeway along the Southern perimeter of site C.

- The Parish Council would also like to establish whether there is any noise pollution from the proposed solar farms.
- The Parish Council does not see any provision for how the construction vehicles would approach the sites along the very rural roads. If constructed it is vital that the construction traffic is routed away from existing rural roads and villages.



Minutes of the Great Staughton Parish Council Meeting held on 14 September 2023 – 7.30pm

Present: R Jewell (BJ), G Brittain (GB), L Goody (LG), N Yates (NY), W Mumford (WM), H Glanville (HG), H Hopperton (HH), J Duberly (JD), Ian Gardener (IG), Stephen Cawley (SC), J Russel – Clerk

NY chaired the meeting as although BJ was present he had had an operation the previous day.

Apologies for absence: David Moore (DM)

Declarations of Interest: JD re planning application Place House

Resident's Forum: Kathy Cairns attended regarding the planning application at 43 The Highway. Kathy objects to this application and had sent an email to the PC prior to the meeting. Kathy states that there are some problems/inaccuracies with the application. There are no concerns from the PC at this stage and HDC will make a decision regarding Kathy's issues in due course. Kathy states that the application is a major intrusion on her property and that privacy is an issue. Carla Young - Carla was pleased that the flashing lights were now working and stated that it had made a difference. The hedge opposite Green Close still has not been cut but this may be due to the time of year as the resident has been contacted. Paul Young can assist if necessary.

Reports from District and County Councillors:

Ian Gardner: He was very pleased to report that GSPC had been successful in its application for the 20mph speed limit in the village. There will be a meeting in October and the decision is provisional until then. There were 76 applications for 20 schemes. Ian reported that the raised crossing in Kimbolton had several complaints about noise. Ian had asked the highways engineer to look at GS's proposals which Ian circulated at the meeting. The raised crossing would cost in excess of £35k as it would be a LHI complex scheme. There would need to be a

consultation. CCC may fund £25K and PC would have to fund the rest. A further flashing MVAS sign could form a non-complex LHi bid. Signage painted on the road to slow traffic would cost £2000.

A new Public Rights of Way Officer has now been appointed and will commence the post in October.

Sharon, the current Highways Officer, is leaving her post and her replacement starts in October. Ian will have having regular meetings with the new officer.

Weeds - CCC has stopped weed killer spraying as of February 2023. There is an online petition to complain about this. Congestion charge – CCC have stated this is not going ahead now but could be revisited in the future.

LHi bids – scheme opens in October 2023. Panel will consider applications in June/July 2024.

Planning application 5 Acres – CCC has granted more time to prepare reports. This application is a waste scheme so it is being dealt with by CCC and will eventually go to planning committee.

BJ informed the meeting that he has asked Highways to replace the 30mph sign – the red lights are not flashing. Swarco were supposed to be doing this in July. IG will chase. WM wanted to pass on thanks to IG for his

constant support for the Parish. BJ then gave a Highways Update – he had previously emailed this to the PC. The current LHI Bid submitted by the PC had been successful. This was for the flashing signs. The school crossing lights are now working. There is also increased visibility around the crossing. Options included more signage, an MVAS sign could be placed on one of the lampposts and the existing speed sign shifted. Unfortunately, due to a cost of nearly £100k it will not be feasible to install at pelican crossing. There are also problems with a raised hump as this could cause disturbance to residents. The hedge owners have all been contacted and will cut the hedges in September/October.

Stephen Cawley: The Green Bin subscription is going ahead despite objections. SC had previously circulated his planning email to the PC. He will also raise with the Landscaping Officer at HDC the trees that need cutting back in Beachampstead.

Minutes of the meeting held on 6 July 2023: Approved.

Matters arising:

Blocked footpath (40) near 5 Acres Salvage yard – see above

Replacement of parish streetlights - this work is now complete. Clerk authorised to pay the invoice.

Gigaclear – still no response. Clerk will chase. HDC Electric Vehicle Pilot – BJ will apply for this.

Attendance at other meetings: LG attended Care Together meeting which is for over 65s. This is a new initiative from CCC to help adults live happily in their home for longer. LG is going to email the PC with further details. This sort of holistic care is already provided in the village, however.

Highways:

Current LHI bid 23/24 – our bid has been successful. This is for a MVAS sign and solar panel. The PC will need to pay a small contribution. We need to decide the location. It was agreed that the best location was coming into the village via Kimbolton Road. BJ will email Highways to confirm location and contribution.

Blocked drains – Green Lane and The Green/ The Highway – these are now cleared.

Remove from agenda.

Blocked highway in Perry – c/f Footpath from Dillington to The Green - the cost for a pavement would be in the region of £140k. Clearly this is outside the resources of the PC.

20mph speed limit – our application was successful – see above

Speed Sign data – remove from agenda. WM has reported seeing speeding vehicles travelling at 100mph through the village. He will call 101 to report if he witnesses this again.

Potholes/Laurel trees – the new HO will look at this once they are in post.

Pedestrian crossing and potential finding – IG had previously circulated an email after his discussion with the HO as to what could be done to improve on road safety. Now we have been successful for a 20mph speed limit the PC was to consider what else was necessary. The road controls suggested by Ian Gardiner

would be considered in the context of an LHI bid. Road markings were noted to be £2000 which could be done separately or included in an LHI bid. Clerk will ask IG whether the £2k cost is for one or two signs.

Bethmar – hedgerow damage - The residents in question had not yet contacted Bethmar themselves about this issue. It was agreed that they should do this first and the PC may get involved if no response was received.

Correspondence: Letter from Janet Bowen regarding maintenance in the village. It was agreed that the following actions would be taken: a notice would be put in Life and on the website and Facebook asking people to cut back hedges to their boundary line. Phil Yates would be asked to spray weed killer. CCC/HDC had already been asked to look at the trees and said they would look at these in September/October. Regarding the potholes the new HO will be asked to look at this.

Neighbourhood Plan: Approval of Draft plan for Regulation 14 – there had been a couple of minor amendments to the document previously circulated. HDC have improved the maps and the document now has a front cover. A strategic Environmental Assessment is now been deemed necessary in respect of the proposed Brook Farm development as a result of a report from Historic England. A surface water risk assessment in respect of Land at 29 The Green should be completed with local wildlife groups. It is hoped these can be undertaken alongside the Regulation 14 Consultation. The steps to be taken now are as follows:

- Agree Plan at this meeting
- Send notification to all interested parties on 15 September
- 20 September to 2 November 2023 is the consultation period.
- A leaflet will be distributed to the village Responses to the consultation will be published on website
- Two drop in sessions and paper copies of the plan held at church, village hall, Doctors, the clerk and BJ

Approval of Consultation approach by Parish Council – all Parish Councillors agreed the Draft Plan and to the Consultation Period taking place between 20 September to 2 November.

BJ wanted to pass on his thanks to Natalie Elsworthy at HDC for all of her assistance.

Reports from:

- Village Hall Committee HG reported that they no longer had the child from CCC using the hall but that finances were healthy with £38k in the bank.
- Playing Field Committee NY reported that the kitchen was completed and the larger room had now been decorated. The first lunch session took place last week and hopefully the pavilion will now receive more bookings. NY has made an application to the Parish Charites for a grant towards the new play equipment They meet in October.
- Speed Watch no report.

Parish Matters: WM wanted the doctor's surgery to clarify their new patient policy as he had received a complaint that a resident in the village could not join the surgery as it was full. But people living outside of the village had joined the surgery as a new patient. HG – footpath impassable Moor Road—Crown Farm are responsible. BJ will send the clerk details.

GB - has noted that cars were parking on the road when the football matches were on. The village hall car park is available for these cars to park rather than use the road.

NY – there has been a delay to the Life Magazine delivery but hopefully DPD are delivering these tomorrow. MJS want to provide the Santa Sleigh this year. This is fun for the children in the village and it does not need to raise money.



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

Dear Friends,

Christmas is fast approaching and, in the days, and weeks before, there are plenty of opportunities to sing carols and Christmas songs.

There is a Benefice Advent Carol Service on Sunday 3rd December at All Saints, Little Staughton at 10.30 am and then on 17th December there is a Benefice Carol service at St.Andrew's ,Great Staughton at 6.00 pm and then in all three churches there are All Age services on Christmas Eve afternoon.

Midnight Mass and Christmas Day All Age Benefice Service are in Great Staughton, but everyone is invited.

In addition, in Hail Weston there is Carol singing around the village and a carol concert by the Mondays.

I think that Christmas carols are part of our lives, we hear them played in shops, we expect to hear the Salvation Army in the streets and hear carols at Children's nativity plays.

It is thought that there were carols as early as Saxon times, but the first carol to be recorded was written in the 13th century by an Italian, Friar Jacopone, called 'Il Presepio,' 'The Crib' and just as a piece of added information, Jacopone died on one Christmas Day.

By 14th century Franciscan Friars were writing happy little carols to accompany their Nativity plays. They were catchy and easy to dance to. The word 'carol' comes from an old French word meaning 'ring dance'.

They were loved by the people because they

could understand them as they were written in French not Latin, but the Pope in Rome disapproved. Because of this many of all the hundreds of carols written in the next 400 years were lost but some reached England in the 14th century and they were written in English.

'Deck the halls with boughs of holly' is an old Welch carol from the 16th century and 'Away in a Manger' which is still a firm favourite with children and adults alike, was thought to have been written by Martin Luther for his own child.

There was the English Collection of carols published in 1521, but it was the Victorian hymn writers who made carols part of Christmas in Church. There are so many carols that have a story behind them like Good King Wenceslas and Silent Night, but it is often the tunes that we love as we sing them over and over again anywhere and everywhere, in the bath, in the car and as we are preparing our meals that resonate with us. I pray that as you sing these well-known tunes you will remember the baby Jesus who is the reason behind all these carols, and also the reason we celebrate Christmas. I also hope that I will see you at one or more of the services over Christmas so that we can join in the celebrations and the singing of carols together.

I wish you all a blessed, safe, and joyful Christmas.
